

Suddenly Goodale sank to his knees, and clutched the ropes.

Papke grasped him by the right arm and appeared to be trying to lift him to his feet. Being unsuccessful, Papke motioned the timekeeper to ring the bell. A general mix-up between fighters, referees and seconds followed, and after about fifteen seconds, one of Goodale's handiers threw a sponge into the ring. The disqualification followed.

Goodale never appeared to have a chance with the former middleweight champion, He outweighed Papke about ten pounds, but this was of no aid to him. Never dur-ing the fight did Goodale land a clean
