WEATHER IN THE GRAIN BELT

Continued Fair is the Prediction for Wednesday.

OMAHA, Neb., June 21, 1910.—The weather continues very warm over the central valleys and throughout the northwest. Temperatures reaching 80° or more were recorded in North Dakota and Montana during Monday. The highest reported was 93 degrees at Great Falls. They continued up to 80 in the west through Nebraska and 100 degrees was again recorded at Culbertson. The highest recorded at Omaha was 80 degrees. The rain which had scattered rains occurred at points in the Ohio valley and southern states, but no precipitation worthy of note occurred in the central valleys within the next few days, but fair weather will probably continue in this vicinity tonight and Wednesday.

The weather is still dry and warm in the corn belt. While damage to corn at present is very small, if any, the drought may reach further south and this feeding has stopped almost entirely.

Wheat was sensationally strong again today on the lack of rain and extremely hot weather in the northwest. The market was bare of offerings and was very quiet. There have been large gains in other. This advance has been heavy for two days' trading.

Corn held strong and higher with the advance in wheat and covering by shorts was heavy. Corn was slightly higher on good demand. Receipts light.

Primary wheat receipts were 233,000 bu.; and exports were 42,000 bu.; against receipts last year of 302,000 bu. and shipments of 61,000 bu.

Primary corn receipts were 78,000 bu. and exports were 10,000 bu.; against receipts last year of 61,000 bu. and shipments of 51,000 bu.

Clearances were 24,000 bu. of corn, 1,000 bu. of oats and wheat and flour equal to 1,000 bushels.

Liverpool closed 1½d higher on wheat and ½d higher on corn.

CHICAGO GRAIN AND PROVISIONS

Features of the Trading and Closing Prices on Board of Trade.

CHICAGO, June 21.—Temperatures of 100 and 102 degrees, dust clouds preventing eight to twelve rods ahead and total absence of rain for the past week, all contributed to a drouth stricken wheat country to the north west presented by traders on change here today. A whirling market resulted and prices of grain were up 10 to 15 cents near the close of business. Final quotations showed a net advance of 23½c to 24½c, as compared with last night's figures. Corn increased from 10 to 12 cents. Oats were 10 cents higher. Provisions closed to higher as did wheat.

By far the greatest speculation is strength in wheat for the market shown. Alarm over the spring crop and the sensational advance in prices in northwestern market was almost the sole cause back of the extreme market movement. The market has been here for several days in regard to the late sown wheat developed into a semi panicle at the out set. It appeared as though the market would be quiet for a while. Commission houses were filled with stop-loss buying orders. Profit taking by holders save the market only a few tempestuous days. The market was quiet for a while. The weather was favorable for a long time and the market was quiet, but the price was up.

Business in the corn pit was of large dimensions. September fluctuations were between 10 and 12 cents. The market closed at 10½c, a net advance of 5½c. The cash market was firm. No. 2 yellow closed at 60½c.

Gasoline futures were a reflection of the factors in other cereals. The variations in the price of the September delivery were bounded by 35c and 39c. Last figures were 37c, a rise of 1½c above the previous close.

July pork alone retained 5¢ of a moderate advance, while all products shared early. September, all the products were net lower and futures settled down 5½c.
