Rains today throughout South and North Dakota occurred just in the nick of time for profit-taking on the part of many dealers. Other selling also was of a most spirited character, but there was a fair reaction in tho last few minutes, the mar-ket closing firm. September fluctuated between 96%c and 20%c, with kiut trans-actions at 960%c, a net rise of exactly lc. Talk of hay shortage was an incentive to buy corn. The September firm at 60%c, a price %20%c above last night's figures. The cash market was firm; No. 1 yellow closed at 60061%c.
