The most excited buying of the session came in the last fifteen minutes when all wheat months went over the dollar level. Opening with a sharp rise due to a dry map northwest, the market more than lost all the gain. The reason was profit taking, but the strength returned and prices went higher than before, following increased scare in the spring wheat belt on account of the absence of general rains and because of the prospects of more heat. Liverpool was reported as taking a serious view of the crop situation on this side. A sudden bulge in quotations at Winnipeg added to the bullish tension. The visible supply showed a larger decrease than expected and the world's shipments were below the estimated world. crease than expected and the world's ship-ments were below the estimated weekly requirements. Shorts sold early, but were all covered later on. September ranged from 98½c to \$1.00½ and closed 1%@1½c up, at \$1.00%. The July option dropped to discount under September today, showing, with the cash delivery, the effect of the coming movement of new wheat. Corn prices broke because of good rains in Illinois, lowa, Missouri and Nebraska. September fluctuated between 50½c and
