Wichita Has an Easy Time Shutting Out Omaha.

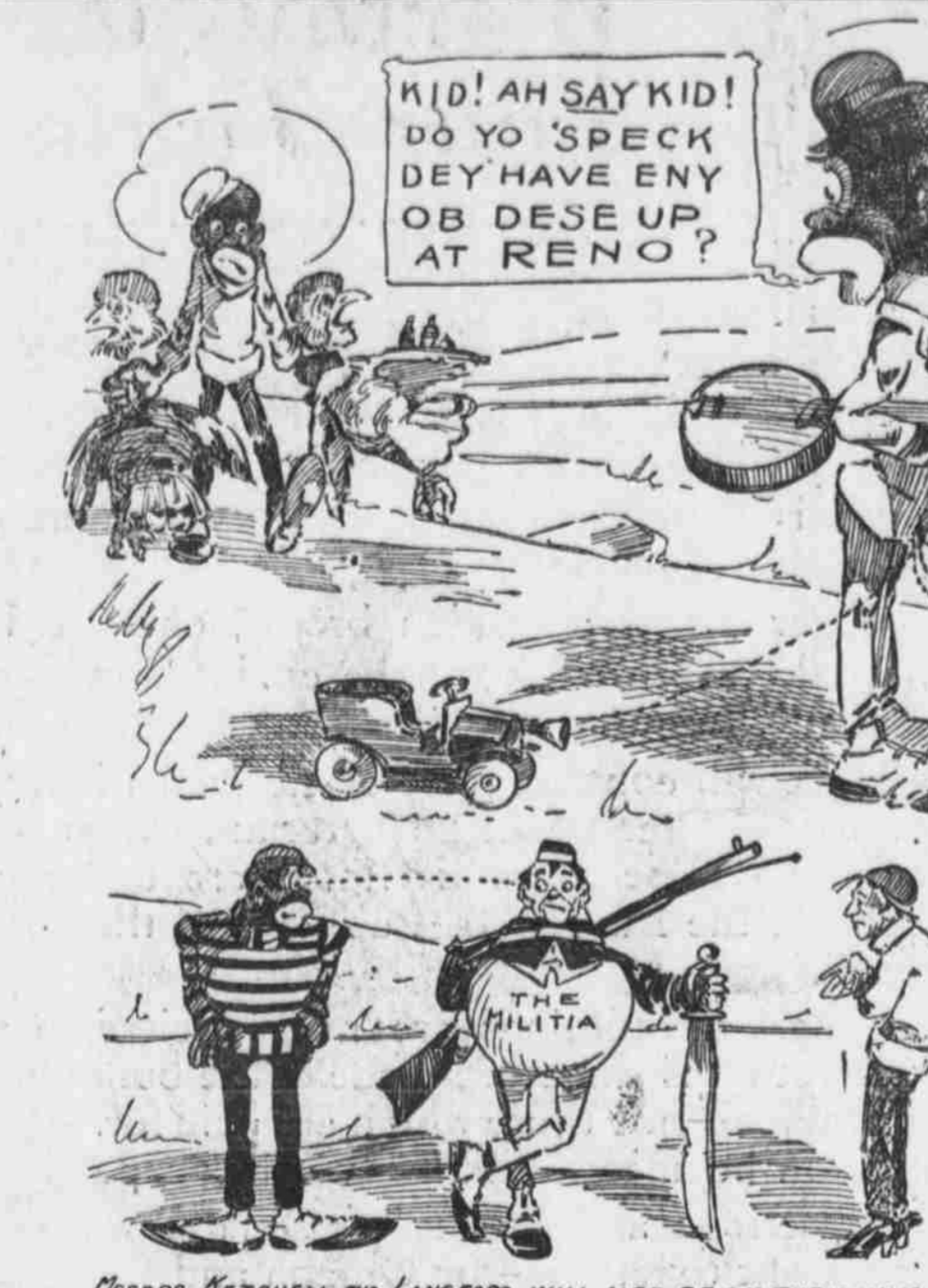
AITCHISON HOLDS LOCALS SAFE
