CATTLE—There were no cattle of any consequence here today and the total for the week and month ending at over 5,000 head, as compared with last week, and of over 1,000 head as compared with a year ago.

On Monday and Tuesday of this week beef cattle sold at the low point of the season, the market being in a badly demoralized condition, not only here, but at every other selling point. As receipts everywhere showed, a very heavy decrease, and as the glut of beef was cleaned up, the market took on a better feeling. Prices gradually firmed up, so that at the present time it is safe to say that the brief period of the week has been all wiped out, and possibly a little more, leaving the market fully steady, but not very close, or possibly a little stronger.

What has been said regarding beef steers would apply to a great extent to the market on cows and heifers. Prices on that kind of cattle have improved rapidly during the last three days, and they are now 25c to 50c higher than the low point. Canners, which did not show as much decline as the better grades, have naturally shown less advance, the medium and good cows showing the most.

Stains in some sections of the country, together with decreased supply, has brought about a decidedly better feeling in the stocker and feeder market, and cattle of that description can, at the close of the week, be quoted 25c to 50c higher than a week ago.

Quotations on cattle: Good to choice corned steers, \$7.00 to \$8.00; fair to good corned steers, \$6.00 to \$7.00; good to choice cows and heifers, \$5.00 to \$6.00; fair to good cows and heifers, \$4.00 to \$5.00; common to fair cows and heifers, \$3.00 to \$4.00.

HOGS—Another mean market developed in the hog yards this morning and, even though supply was limited, it required considerable effort to move offerings at figures that were 10c to 15c lower than yesterday's average. Traders shipped out fully 1,000 head of mixed hogs during early hours, but one of the larger packers proved a poor purchaser and competition was very slack throughout.

Three killing droves, aggregating 4,300 head, cost about \$2.00, heavier and rough mixed had to sell around \$2.00 to \$2.50, fair to good mixed moved at or near \$3.00. Lights sold at the high figure of \$3.00. Despite the dull tone to trade, the big end of supply changed hands before midday. Closing rounds were very slow at the full decline.

A large portion of receipts went at \$3.00 to \$3.50, as compared with yesterday's average of \$3.00 to \$3.50. Demand on most days has just about equalled supply, with little movement has not been very active, holdover hogs were not numerous enough to exert a very strong bearish influence on the trade. Current sales are just about 50c lower than those of a week ago.

WEATHER IN THE GRAIN BELT and nearby. OMAHA, July 2, 1910. Warm weather continued during the last twenty-four hours in the plains states, the central valleys, and throughout the east and south. The temperature was very high in the lake region. It reached 100 degrees at Green Bay, Wis., and was high up in the nineties throughout the entire lake region. A slight but general fall in temperature is shown this morning from the Missouri river west to the mountains, elsewhere slight but general rise is shown, but no important nor decided change has occurred in any portion of the country since the preceding report. Widely scattered showers occurred in the upper Missouri valley, the northwest, and mountain district. The largest fall reported being .58 of an inch, at Valentine, Neb. Showers were general in the lower Mississippi valley within the last twenty-four hours, and continue in the middle gulf states this morning. White considerable cloudiness prevailed in the central valleys, the outlook is for continued fair in this vicinity tonight and Sunday, with no important change in temperature.
