OMAHAN DIES BY LAKESIDE

Amor Royster Passes Away at Manawa—Overcome by Heat.

FOUND NEAR THE KURSAAL

Holding of Inquest Raises Technical Question of Jurisdiction

Sarpy County May Have Claim.

Amos Royster, assistant engineer of the Brandeis block, Omaha, was found in a dying condition a short distance back of the Kursaal at Lake Manawa about 10 o'clock Thursday night by Robert Minter and Robert Furt, employees at the amusement pavilion.

He died before any statement could be obtained from him that would lead to his identity last night.

The body was taken to the pavilion and cared for, and was later taken in charge by Coroner Traynor and brought to Elks Cutler's undertaking establishment.

A stamped addressed envelope to Mrs. Kate Elmer, Florence, Neb., but containing only a blank piece of paper, was found in one of his pockets, which later led to revealing the identity of the dead man.

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
