GET DATA FOR NEW ROAD

Commercial Club is After a Line to South Dakota.

A special committee of the Commercial club is working steadily in behalf of the proposed direct line from Omaha to Yankton. Plans are being selected regarding possibilities of tracks along the proposed line, which will be in line with the Milwaukee road.

It is regarded as wise to store up ammunition of the kind at this time rather than to fire it because just now railroads are not doing much new building, but pending rather, a policy of retrenchment. Some months hence the club will lay before the railroad the arguments and data as to the amount of business which will result from the building of a line from Yankton here.

The Dakota city desires direct communication with Omaha just as earnestly as does this city, and activity is also being manifested there. Much of the enthusiasm for the proposed line has come about since the visit to Yankton of the last trade meeting excursion, and it is an open secret that the Commercial club had such a hope in view when it invited Yankton to its dinner.

C. S. Hayward is chairman of the committee, which is collecting traffic data for argument's sake, and the other members are David Cole, W. M. Glass, F. L. Baker, George H. Eddy, Luther Knutson, W. M. McCord and Nathan Morrison.

The executive committee of the club will hold no meeting Tuesday, having adjourned for the summer subject to the call at any time of the chairman.

There are several witnesses who saw Colligan with Alkire and who will appear when the case comes to trial.

Mr. Howell said he will not be a candidate for re-election to the state senate. Senator John M. Tanner of South Omaha refused to comment on Mr. Bryan's criticism in any way, now. "I am going away for a few days to Chadron," said Senator Tanner, "and when I return maybe I will have something to say."

Teachers Show Vocational Trend

Educational Meeting Gives Favor to Special Training Idea, Mr. Davidson Says.

The keynote of the convention of the National Educational association was a trend toward vocational training, said W. M. Davidson, city superintendent of instruction, who has just returned from the Boston meeting.

"The one thing that will keep this tendency from over development is the strong conservative feeling of the people whose children attend the public schools and who will resist too great a swing in the direction of special education."

The election of Mrs. Ella Flegg Young of Chicago as president of the association was the first successful attempt of any candidate to get the office against the report of an adverse nominating committee.

In 1906 at St. Paul, when James H. Canfield was president, one faction tried to name a candidate irregularly, but was repressed. This time Mrs. Young's name was brought up in the meeting of the nominating committee by Dr. A. E. Winship, the man who has been trying to get the office for her because of his belief that irrespective of the fact that she was a woman, she is the most capable person for the office. The votes of the committee stood about two to one for Dr. Taylor, but Dr. Winship asserted the right to present a minority report. When the report was made it was allowed and the vote was two to one for Mrs. Young. It was entirely independent of anything but the fact of her great ability, however. She was elected because of her fitness for the office."

Protest Against Raise in Rates

Railroads and Big Firms Object to Stock Yards Raising Switching Charges.

All the railroads, large grain interests, and companies that have any cars to be handled, have risen up in their wrath and are in meeting at Lincoln today to protest against the Union Stock Yards company being allowed to raise their switching rates in the yards. The plan of the stock yards company is to double the existing rates of handling cars, which is \$2 per car, and to this proposition none of the firms whose cars are handled is willing to agree, as today representatives of the stock yards and of the different firms are in consultation with the State Railway commission.

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ROADS WOULD REOPEN CASE

To Ask for a Rehearing in the Missouri Valley Decision.

Chicago Shippers Also Sign Petition—Local Jobbers Do Not Think Court Will Reopen Case for Further Argument.

Omaha shippers are little concerned over the petition to the supreme court of the United States for a rehearing of the argument on the Missouri river case, on which the court based its decision in favor of the Interstate Commerce commission and against the railroads.

The Omaha shippers, who joined with those of Kansas City and St. Joseph in fighting the case to ultimate victory believe first that it is unlikely that the supreme court will consent to reopen the case, and second, that it will do the railroad little good, if it is reopened. Railroad publications are laying stress upon the fact that the petition for the rehearing is signed by a number of Chicago shippers. Some claim it is being laid to their credit also by the fact that the supreme court recently ordered argument of the Tobacco trust and Standard Oil cases, but it is thought by them that the same condition may apply.

Attorneys accustomed to practice before the supreme court and familiar with its procedure declare that this view is wrong; that for obvious reasons the supreme court is little inclined to hear cases over again and will not, except in the most exceptionally important cases, where as in the tobacco and oil cases death of a member of the court seemed to require it.

Those favoring a rehearing of the Missouri river case say "the court failed to appreciate the fact that the change from the seaboard to the Missouri river is not a single through rate, but two separate and distinct rates."

The Interstate Commerce commission and the supreme court deny that this is a fact, but say it is just the other way.

Human Target Resents Bullet

Curious Sebastian Causes Arrest of Angelo Before Discharging Revolver on Street.

Because of the absence of the necessary witnesses and an interpreter, the case against Angelo Befor, who is alleged to have fired several shots at Curious Sebastian near Fourth and Pierce streets Sunday evening, will not be tried until Tuesday morning. It was stated by Sebastian Sunday night that he had been the target of several of Befor's misaimed bullets. Monday morning, however, he wanted the charge removed from Befor, stating that when he made the complaint he was drunk and might have been mistaken as to exactly who Befor was shooting at. Both men hail from Italy.
