

HAS LONG TALK WITH HUGHES

Will Favor Nomination of Man Who Can Command Support of Rank and File and of Independ-

ent Voters.

OYSTER BAY, July 13 .- Theodore Rooseelt today gave the first indication of his position in respect to the nomination of a republican candidate for governor of New York this fall. In an interview he said:

'My position in regard to the governorship this fall is this: I want to find the best man for the office; the man who is most acceptable to the rank and file of the republican party and the independent voters, I intend to do everything in my power to see that such a man is elected." Colonel Roosevelt's indication of his posts tion, made less than an hour after the departure for New York of Governor Hughes. is taken as a significant sidelight on the conference between the governor and the olonel. While both men refused this morieing to disclose the precise subject matter of their talk, it is believed it was decided that Mr. Roosevelt would take an active personal part in regard to the nomination of a candidate for governor.

Hughes Starts for New York. Governor Hughes left at 10 o'clock for New York in the automobile of William R. Wilcex. He said he would meet his milltary secretary, Frederick M. Crosset, at the Hotel Astor and that they would leave this afternoon for Washington. Colonel Roosevelt was smiling confentedly

when he was seen shortly afterward. "I had a delightful visit with Governor Hughes," said he. "We had a most in teresting talk. "Did you talk politics with him?" he was

asked. The question seemed to amuse him. "Of course, we talked of political conditions," he replied. "What else could we talk about? We discussed things which we have been anxious for a long time to

talk of." He was asked if he thought harmony in the party of the state was to be expected during the campaign and replied that be Should the president of the United States thought there would be no difficulty on that score.
