FLYING IN ITS INFANCY

Glenn Curtiss Looks for Great Strides in Short Time.

LAND TRAVEL SOON ANTIQUATED

Regular Lines of Transportation Will Soon Be Established for Mail and People—Even Across the Seas.

Glenn H. Curtiss believes that tremendous strides forward will be made in aerial navigation in the course of the next few years. "I have been a conservative upon this subject," said he, "until recent years, but now I can begin to see wonderful progress ahead."

Within the next twenty-five years travel in the air will become the chief means of locomotion. Land transportation is destined ultimately to become as antiquated as the ox team now is.

"When you come to think of it, flying offers a field of travel which it not subject to the limitations which affect both land and water transportation. Certainly with respect to speed we have reached the limits of practicability on these old surfaces, but in the air we shall soon be flying 100 to 150 miles an hour, if not more."

"It is certain, too, that aviation will become safer than it now is. As matters are at present, with proper precaution and experience and the right kind of aeroplane, no falls are necessary. Likelihood of accidents is going to become less and less as improvements already figured out are adopted and utilized."

Regular Service Soon. "We have gone far enough to warrant the prediction that in the course of not many years regular service by air will be established from town to town and from city to city, and even across the great waters."

At this point Curtiss stopped to bend down over an instrument which indicates humidity. "Seventy-two," he announced with some pleasure. "The flights will be good this afternoon unless it rains heavily."

A little pocket aneroid lay open beside the more complicated instrument. Curtiss always carries this aneroid and consults it from time to time. Big barometric changes are decidedly important in cross-country flights and they sometimes occur with startling suddenness.
