John H. Gibbons is Laid at Rest

Body of Well Known Former Member of Police Force Laid Away in Holy Sepulcher.

Numerous and representative was the gathering of mourners at the funeral yesterday afternoon of the late ex-sergeant John H. Gibbons, who was one of the most popular and respected members of the city police force.
The cortege, which was headed by a platoon of his late comrades in the department, commanded by Lieutenant Hayes, and followed by a long line of carriages, left the residence, 328 North Twenty-eighth avenue, at 2:30 for the Church of the Sacred Heart.
The burial service there was read by Father Judge, following which the body was taken to Holy Sepulcher cemetery and placed in a reception vault, pending the arrival of the brother, Michael, from West Chester, Pa., when the interment will be made.

JOHN SOUKUP TAKES ACID AND IS DEAD

Porter at Prague Hotel Found after Swallowing Poison with Suicidal Intent.

John Soukup died yesterday evening at the Prague hotel, Thirteenth and William streets, from carbolic acid poisoning, and Coroner Crosby, who has taken charge of the body, thinks it is a case of suicide.
Soukup was a Bohemian, with no relatives in this country, and had been employed at the Prague hotel since Easter. He had not been in ill health and nothing has so far been discovered to indicate any reason for his taking his life.
He was found in one of the rooms by two other employees of the hotel, P. J. Hazal and Frank Neshky, who had been attracted there by what they described as a peculiar odor.

JAMES TRACY IS BURIED HERE

Body of Man Killed at Grand Island Brought to Omaha.

James Tracy of 1406 Boulevard avenue, aged 46 years, died in a hospital at Grand Island Sunday evening, following a railroad accident which occurred a few days previous.
Mr. Tracy at the time of the accident was seated on a platform next to the track, when a train approached unexpectedly and he was struck.
Mr. Tracy had been a resident of Omaha twenty years and is survived by his widow. The funeral services were held from St. Patrick's church Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock, and interment made in Holy Sepulcher cemetery.

MOVE TO REMOVE DONAHUE

Governor Orders Suit to Oust Chief and Three Members of Board.

KARBACH FILES THE COMPLAINT

It Charges that Liquor is Illegally Sold at Many Places and that Officers Refuse to Take Any Action.

LINCOLN, Neb., July 25.—(Special Telegram.)—Governor Shallenberger this morning directed the attorney general to bring quo warranto proceedings to oust from office Chief of Police Donahue of Omaha, Fred Hoye, William J. Hunter and William F. Wappich, members of the Omaha Fire and Police board, for failing to enforce the liquor laws in Omaha.
The governor acted upon a complaint filed with him by Charles J. Karbach, member of the Fire and Police board. In the complaint it is charged that houses of prostitution to the number of 238 have taken out government licenses to sell intoxicating liquors and have no city license, and that they sell beer at all hours of the day and night and on Sundays. Karbach alleges that he personally visited the red light district and was solicited to enter the houses by girls, and that he informed Chief Donahue of what he saw. The reply the chief made to the complaint, he says, was this: "You a liar and don't know anything about it. The women were probably stuck on your whiskers." Karbach alleges that liquor has been sold illegally at the Dahlman club, the Lory, the Holly Green's, Master Coffee house, Mrs. Pat Moore's, The Colonial, Wroth's Chili parlors, 313 South Tenth street, The Midway, 1417 Douglas street, Owl club's club rooms, Sixteenth and North, Leavenworth; Mechanics club, 1113 Farnam street, upstairs; 1409 Jackson, Seventh and Pierce; Italian grocer; Bourke, Tenth and Davenport; 714 North Sixteenth, upstairs; 1221 Douglas, upstairs; Big Four saloon, 216 South Fourteenth and North; and Douglas.

CHIEF TALKS OF THE MOVEMENT

Says His Books Are Open and Karbach Knows What Has Been Done.
"I can't say anything about such matters, because I don't understand it," said Chief Donahue. "My records, describing the liquor laws have been in the board's files all along and they were sent to the board when he desired information. I haven't seen any of the board since this came out, as I don't know what they think about it. Certainly Mr. Karbach knows from my records what I have been doing, and it has been all that could be done."

"I thought that the liquor laws were being enforced," says Mr. Wappich, one of the members included in the accusations. "As far as I have been able to find out they are and if anybody expects me to sneak around the alleys and pry into doors to see whether or not some one is drinking glasses of beer they will be disappointed. We can't put an officer before every cafe and club in the city. The police force has other things to do and it is too small for its ordinary duties without exercising anything more than a reasonable supervision over the sale of liquor."

"I suppose that everything was right," said Fred Hoye. "I have served with a bona fide notice and see just what the charges are. I can't say much about it. As far as the motives for such an action are concerned I don't have any idea of what they might be. I have been told that it was all an election dodge on the part of Shallenberger, but of course we don't know."

"This is not being done in the interests of anybody but the citizens who approve of law enforcement," says Mr. Karbach. "There has been absolutely no conversation on the matter between me and any liquor representatives. I do know, however, that the non-enforcement of the law works a real hardship on the brewers and their interests. It is manifestly unfair to the citizen keeping to pay his \$1,000 and observe the closing laws and have an assignment house upstairs and pay no license fee at all."

"I have never given up this campaign against the non-enforcement of the liquor laws since I first began it. The chief says that I agreed to an endorsement of the reply he made to the governor's letter. I did not endorse it and I would not. I have been fighting Chief Donahue ever since he has been on the board and shall continue to do so. The trouble is that all the discussion goes on in executive session and never gets into the records."
