From the twelfth to the seventeenth Evans was Phelps' master. He won the twelfth, four teenth and seventeenth. On the seventeenth Evans got a two, the reversal of which cost him the match in the afternoon. That made him 3 up, but from then on he was never able to get Phelps at 2 disanvantage. An unusual feature of the match was the halving of the first eleven holes of the morning round. Neither man was able to win a hole until Evana took the twelfth, 5-6 Evans putted poorly on many greens, while Phelps was ragged in that department during the first haif of the morning round. While Evans putted poorly at times he had bad luck in the last two holes of the match. 
