VICINITY OF THUGS IS DEAD

James Murphy Dies After a Week of Great Suffering. MYSTERY SURROUNDS ASSAULT. Tells Doctor He is Set Upon by Two Colored and One White Man—Face Badly Cut Up When He Seeks Physician.

Absolute mystery surrounds the death of James Murphy, 170 G Street, who died Monday at the Omaha General hospital following a supposed assault on Saturday evening, July 31. The coroner has been unable to locate any of the deceased man's relatives, and the police have no record of the assault, which is reported to have been a most malicious nature.

"There was a cut on his lip that he wanted sewed, but he at first refused to allow me to attend the injuries on his head, which needed medical attention badly. I declined to assist him unless he would let me dress all his wounds, and after some trouble I finally succeeded in getting at them.

"The man said he was employed at the Illinois Central freight house, and was about 45 years of age. He was in an intoxicated condition at the time, and told me of his assault. He stated that when he was in an alley near the Loew's Opera building at Twelfth and Dawson streets, two negroes and a white man set upon him and attempted to rob him. He said that they beat him unmercifully, but did not succeed in taking his money away from him, and he had \$15 when here.

Oil of Sunflower for Painters' Use

Idea City Chemist Crowley Brings Home from Convention of Pacific Coast.

Arthur Jetter is Drowned in Pappio Ditch

Son of the South Omaha Brewer Falls Into Water and Loses Life.

Arthur Jetter, youngest son of Balthaz Jetter, president of the Jetter Brewing company, was drowned in the ditch of Pappio creek Monday at 1 p. m. The fatality occurred a few feet west of the bridge where the Missouri Pacific crosses the Pappio ditch only a few rods north and east of Seymour lake.

The boys by their cries attracted the attention of Charles Anderson, motorman on the Railroad, and Anderson ran to the place, but the boy had disappeared and as Anderson could not swim his efforts were futile. A call for help was given by telephone and some of the men of the neighborhood conducted a search. It was two hours before Chief of Police and E. C. Craig of Ralston arrived. They went into the ditch above the bridge. There the body was found two hours after the drowning in seven feet of water.

In the meantime, Henry, William and Martin Jetter had arrived. Dr. E. L. DeLaney also came in an automobile and immediately began the work of resuscitation. Strong men of the party worked for an hour steadily and used artificial respiration, but at the end of that time there was no response to the treatment. For a few moments Dr. DeLaney made the heart throb, but there was no blood in the arteries and the organ soon stopped.

PRECIPITATION IS VERY SMALL

In the Vicinity of Omaha Deficiency of Rain During July is Remarkable.

The monthly meteorological summary of the United States weather bureau shows that the precipitation in Omaha for July this year is far from being up to the average of recent years. It was but 1.96, as against 4.60 last year, 2.47 in 1908 and 6.45 in 1907. The greatest precipitation during July was on the 10th, and the deficiency for the month is 2.64. There is a deficiency of 13.85 since January 1.
