Roosevelt Again Renews Talks on Things Political

Confers with Gifford Pinchot and James Garfield—Loeb Spends Night at Oyster Bay.

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., Aug. 10.—Theodore Roosevelt spent this evening talking politics with William Loeb, jr., collector of the port of New York. Tomorrow he is expected to have a conference with Gifford Pinchot, former chief forester, and James R. Garfield, ex-secretary of the interior. For the last two weeks there have been no political visitors at Sagamore Hill, and the reason of confidence of such a nature is taken as an indication that the president may be preparing to engage more actively in political affairs. When Colonel Roosevelt returned from New York this afternoon Mr. Loeb motored down with him to spend the night. NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—Theodore Roosevelt spent the day at his editorial offices in this city. Senator Jonathan Bourne of Oregon met him by appointment. "Was your talk with Colonel Roosevelt about politics?" the senator was asked. "I explained to Colonel Roosevelt how Oregon through her initiative and referendum, direct primary, corrupt practices and recall laws has evolved, adopted and demonstrated the most effective form of popular government known to the world. "Colonel Roosevelt's indorsement is not essential to the ultimate success of the cause, but, believing that he has the same confidence in the honesty and intelligence of the people that they have demonstrated they had in his and appreciating his prominence before the world, I realize that his advocacy will accelerate the adoption of similar laws in other states. This was the mission of my call." "What did he say?" "You will have to ask him." Colonel Roosevelt, after the senator's departure, said he was greatly interested in his visitor's recital and was already on record as favoring progressive legislation.

LOWA CORN CROP OUTLOOK IS GOOD

State Bulletin Says It is Above Ten-Year Average, Despite Drouth. CORN PRODUCE IN IOWA are better than the average for the last ten years and are practically equal to 1909, according to the weekly report of Dr. George M. Chapin, director of the Iowa weather and crop service. In comparison with July 1 there has been a decided improvement in the corn outlook. The northwestern and southwestern corners of the state have suffered from lack of rain, however, and this has brought down the state's average. The western half of the state, which has had 67 per cent of the corn acreage, has 83 per cent as compared with 88 per cent in the eastern half. The northwestern quarter of Iowa leads with 97 per cent, and the southeastern quarter closely follows with 96 per cent. Where the rainfall has been lightest the percentage follows: Northwestern, 80 per cent, and southwestern, 80 per cent. The average for the state, Dr. Chapin says, is therefore 86 per cent. "Following is a summary of reports from crop correspondents of the Iowa weather and crop service, showing the estimated condition of staple crops August 1, as compared with the average condition on that date in the last year. There has been a decided improvement in the condition of corn during the last month over the larger part of the state and especially over the northwestern, southwestern and many of the southern counties where showers have been timely and rainfall sufficient to keep the plants growing rapidly. On the other hand, the condition has declined over the northeastern and some of the southwestern counties, due to a deficiency of moisture. The average condition of corn for the four quarters of the state are as follows: Northwest, quarter, 97 per cent; northeast, 86 per cent; southwest, 86 per cent; and southeast, 80 per cent, which makes an average for the state of 86.5 per cent. The average condition for the state, which has 67 per cent of the corn acreage, is 83 per cent as compared with 88 per cent for the eastern half."
