



tics-Gore Among Speakers. OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 12 .- An endorse ment of the administration of Governor Haskell and recommendation that the liquor question be eliminated from partisan politics, were the chief features of the platform adopted by the democratic state convention here today. Among the speakers were United States Senator Gore, who, referring to the charges against him since the congressional committee began investigating the McMurray contracts, said: "He is a coward who would be driven

from the path of duty by fear of calumny." The platform indorses the bank guaranty law, holds that the question of prohibition has been removed from partisan politics, supports the policy of the administration to erect a state capitol without cost to the tax payers; declares for a strict enforce-

ment of corporation laws, insists the interior department's rule of Indian affairs has resulted in a "deplorable condition r sulting from mis-government" and demands that the United States government "immediately right its wrongful policy and place the administration of laws in the hands of those unselfish enough faithfully to administer that great trust."
