

ROOSEVELT PLANS FOR TRIP

Ex-President Will Leave for Utica, New York, August 23.

LONG JUMP THEN TO CHEYENNE

Will Stay Half Hour in Omaha on Westward Journey—Speaks Here on Panama Canal on Return.

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., Aug. 21.—Theodore Roosevelt will start Tuesday on a journey of 5,400 miles, which will extend over nearly three weeks, and in the course of which he will travel through fourteen states. During the tour he will deliver fourteen speeches, one in each state.

The party will travel in the private car Republic, attached to regular trains, except in a few cases in which special trains will be used for short distances to enable Colonel Roosevelt to fill all his engagements. Ernest Abbott and W. B. Howland of New York, who are associated with him in his editorial work, and Frank Harper, his secretary, will travel with him.

In addition to his set speeches, Colonel Roosevelt will make many extemporaneous addresses from the rear platform of his car. At almost every point along the line of travel elaborate preparations will be made, and he will be met by a large number of people. He will be governed in his movements by a schedule which will keep him on the move during his waking hours.

Starts August 23.

The start will be made at 10 a. m. on August 23 and the first day's journey will be over the New York Central railway to Utica. Directly he arrives he will go by trolley car to Oriskany, nine miles out of Utica, thence to Summit park, a mile further on, where he is to deliver an address to the farmers of Herkimer and Oneida counties. He will spend the night at Onondaga, Herkimer county, at the country home of his brother-in-law, Douglas Robinson of New York.

The journey westward will be resumed at midnight the next night over the New York Central line to Chicago, where the party is due at 9 p. m. August 25. At 10:45 p. m. the same night, the party will leave for Omaha, over the Chicago & Northwestern. Arriving here at 3:25 p. m., August 26, the car will leave at 4 p. m., going by the Union Pacific railway to Cheyenne, Wyo., which will be reached at 10:25 a. m., August 27.

Second speech at Cheyenne.

At Cheyenne, Colonel Roosevelt will deliver his second set speech, at the city's carnival. He will spend Sunday with Governor Brooks of Wyoming, at Cheyenne and will leave Cheyenne at 8:35 a. m., August 29, going over the Union Pacific to Denver, where he is to arrive at 11:35 that morning. In Denver he will speak on conservation remaining there until 1 p. m. August 30, when he will start for Pueblo, Colo., over the Denver & Rio Grande. He will reach Pueblo at noon and leave at 12:30 p. m. over the Missouri Pacific for Olathe, Kan., where he is due at 9:30 a. m., August 31.

At Olathe the ex-president will deliver one of the most important speeches of the trip. In it he will deal with the number of the problems with which the national administration is especially concerned. He will remain over night at Olathe and leave for St. Paul, Minn., over the Burlington & Quincy railroad at 9:25 a. m. on September 1 for Kansas City, where he is scheduled to arrive at 12:15 p. m. on that date.

Kansas City to Omaha.

The Kansas City speech will be delivered before the Commercial club. Colonel Roosevelt will stay in the city until 10:40 p. m., when he will depart over the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad for Omaha. Arriving at Omaha at 6:45 a. m. on September 2 he will make a speech on the Panama canal and spend the night there.

The party will start out again at 7:30 a. m. on September 3 over the Chicago & Northwestern railroad for Sioux Falls, S. D., where he will arrive at 10:30 p. m. on that date. At 8 a. m. on September 4 Colonel Roosevelt will leave over the Great Northern for Fargo, N. D., reaching there at 4 p. m. He will attend the Labor day celebration at Fargo and talk on labor.

Leaving Fargo at 11:35 p. m. on September 5 over the Northern Pacific the colonel will reach St. Paul at 7:40 a. m. on September 6. He will spend the day there, attend the state fair and speak on conservation at the National Conservation congress. He will depart from St. Paul at 10:30 p. m. the same day over the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad and will reach Milwaukee at 7:50 a. m. on September 7.

Speech to Press Club.

The Milwaukee speech will be delivered before the Press club of that city. Colonel Roosevelt will remain over night there, leaving at 7 a. m. on September 8 over the Chicago & Northwestern railroad for Freeport, Ill. He is due there at 11 a. m. the same day to speak at a picnic of railway trainmen and firemen. Leaving at 1:10 p. m., he is to reach Chicago at 4:55 p. m. and speak that night before the Hamilton club.

He will leave Chicago at midnight and the remainder of the journey will be made over the Pennsylvania railroad. Cincinnati will be reached at 8 a. m. September 9 and Colonel Roosevelt will spend the day and night there, leaving at 9 a. m. on September 10 for Pittsburgh. Reaching Pittsburgh at 8:20 p. m. that day, he will speak before the Civic league and leave at 11:10 p. m. The journey will be continued with the arrival at New York at 9:15 a. m. on September 11.

NEW RAILROAD FOR CHEYENNE

First Train Run Saturday Over Link Connecting Burlington and Colorado Southern.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Aug. 21.—(Special.)—The last spike in the Colorado & Southern and Burlington's connecting link in this city was driven Friday evening, and at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon the first train, consisting of six passenger coaches filled with railroad officials, federal, state, county and city officials, members of the press and citizens generally, passed over the new track, making a run from the Colorado & Southern terminal in West Cheyenne to the Burlington depot on Capitol avenue. Large crowds of enthusiastic people witnessed the passage of the train through the business section and its arrival at the Burlington depot. This is the first connection made between the Colorado & Southern lines of the Burlington, and the parent system. Trains will be operated daily over this track from now on, and it is reported that a new passenger station will be built on Carey avenue, the Burlington abandoning its present depot at the foot of Capitol avenue, and occupying the new station jointly with the Colorado & Southern.

MILWAUKEE EARNING MORE

Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Shows Big Increase.

SURPLUS MAY REACH MILLION

Report Just Issued Shows June Earnings to Be Way Up and Annual Report is Promised to Be Considerably Ahead.

Reports from the Milwaukee have just been issued, showing that the earnings of the railroad for June bring the dividend totals of the year to a surplus of from \$50,000 to \$1,000,000 above that of last year. The increase, according to the report, will hold as being outside the income of \$1,000,000 which comes from the charge made against the Puget Sound railroad for the use of plants and for proportionate expenses in the conduct of the Milwaukee & Puget Sound railroad. It is announced that the next annual report will show the Puget Sound railroad making a respectable return on the money invested in it. It is expected the younger line will furnish \$4,000,000 interest on the first \$100,000,000 of first mortgage bonds turned over to it by the parent company. Some months ago the Milwaukee filed with the stock exchange an income account for eight months of last year, in which income from investments was given as \$4,225,396, against only \$1,000,000 for the same of the previous year. This great gain was largely the result of interest payments from the Puget Sound, but to just what extent it has been impossible to ascertain. If this item for eight months includes only the accruals of that period the investment income for the entire year should approximate \$6,000,000, and in that case the Milwaukee would have covered its dividends beyond all question.

New Offices at Salt Lake.

The Oregon Short Line has planned a mammoth structure for general office purposes in Salt Lake City, Utah. It will be large enough to house the entire general offices, and it is now learned that the engineers have received orders to make their plans for a building that will meet the requirements of the big company for many years to come. This means that the building will probably be more than six stories high. Each department will have its rooms planned for the special uses of the department. The engineering rooms, for instance, are to include the most modern blue print room, and the ticket department will be provided with a fireproof stock room. Each head of a department will confer with the supervising architect with a view of evolving the most perfect railroad headquarters ever built. The company will put from \$50,000 to \$70,000 into this great structure.

Railroad Notes.

When passenger service between Salt Lake City and the coast begins this month, the Globe Express company, a Gould corporation, will operate over the line. It is estimated that this corporation and the Pacific Express may be combined, the name of the Globe retained. The total assessment roll of railroad

property in California has been fixed at \$130,396,141 for this year by the State Board of Equalization, an increase of \$8,313,968 over last year.

Burlington officials have cancelled the order requiring the removal of engine crews from Aurora, Ill. It would have disturbed 400 families.

The Grand Trunk railway of Canada has declared the regular semi-annual dividend of 2 1/2 per cent on the second preferred stock.

The Salt Lake route has under consideration the building of a line from Oasin, on the main line, to Fish Springs, in the Deep Creek country, 150 miles, and perhaps to Ely, Nev., but probably will not settle the matter until after the new road through Meadow Valley, Wash., has been completed. Bids for the latter will soon be invited.

Building Boom at Sioux Falls

Record of New Construction for the Year Will Exceed Two Million Dollars.

SIoux FALLS, S. D., Aug. 21.—(Special.)—Figures just compiled by the Daily Argus-Leader show that Sioux Falls is doing more in the building line than any other city of its size in the west or northwest. Business houses completed during the last twelve months or in course of construction at the present time represent a total of \$1,682,000. The largest item in this total is the Morrison Packing company, which is erecting a new plant, consisting of eight brick and concrete buildings and two frame structures, at a cost of \$750,000. In addition to the business houses, during the last twelve months, including those now under construction, new residences to the value of \$12,750 have been or are being erected. This makes a grand total of \$1,694,750 worth of new business houses and residences during the twelve months. In addition to the above, other improvements have been decided upon which will cost in the aggregate about \$200,000, these including a \$20,000 addition to the government building, for which congress already has made the necessary appropriation, and a sewer through the western part of the city which will cost \$100,000, and for which contracts will be awarded September 1.

TWO BOYS BURN TO DEATH

Wayne Paris and Teddy Thurber Set Fire to Hay Loft and Lose Their Lives.

MARSHALLTOWN, Ia., Aug. 21.—(Special Telegram.)—Matches in the hands of small boys proved fatal to Wayne Paris, aged 8, and Teddy Turner aged 6, at Marshalltown, Ia., last evening. The boys set fire to a hay loft and their bodies were burned to a crisp.
