Roosevelt bore tribute to the services rendered by Senator Burkett at critical times in his administration as president, and complimented the senior senator very highly by reading part of an address made by him in the senate touching the high qualities of the senator.

Being insistently called for, Iowa's senior senator stepped to the edge of the platform, hat in hand, and made himself heard to every corner of the hall as he commended certain utterances of Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln and Theodore Roosevelt.

Multitude Through Auditorium.  
The crowd which heard Roosevelt's speech began to gather hours before 3 o'clock, the time set for the doors to be opened, it being on record that the first would-be auditor arrived at the auditorium doors at high noon.

Friday's crowd was typically American. It was composed of poor men, rich men and beggar men, and women and children, all rubbing elbows, and it was surely a Roosevelt crowd in spirit.

There was a good deal of crushing when the doors of the Auditorium were thrown open, and yet in a twinkling the thronging multitude was a good-natured one, and its units laughed and joked each other as the fight was made to secure eligible seats.

A few minutes after 4 o'clock the colonel arrived. He was seated with Victor Rosewater in the tonneau of the Dicta machine, and as he drove along Howard street to the side of the Auditorium entrance the cheers and applause which went up from the crowd along the route were almost deafening.

William I. Kierstead and his three aides, Charles L. Sanders, Charles H. Withnell, and George F. West, handled the stage arrangements and the accommodations for the press men in admirable fashion.

Following in the text of the Roosevelt address on "The Panama Canal," "In traveling in Europe last spring one thing which especially struck me was the fact that the two facts which made the deepest impression abroad were the cruise of the battle fleet around the world and the digging of the Panama canal.

### WELCOME AT SIOUX FALLS

South Dakota Metropolis Plans Elaborate Reception for Teddy.

### CITY DECORATED WITH LIGHTS

Competitive Drill of Companies of the National Guard Will Precede Arrival of Train in Afternoon.

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Sept. 2.—(Special.)—During the past two days the work of decorating the business houses and streets of the city, and making other preparations for the visit of Theodore Roosevelt, has been going on actively.

On the main business streets will be a number of arches and at night these will be brilliantly illuminated by thousands of electric lights.

The hours from 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon until 4 o'clock will be taken up with this competitive drill, which will take place on Main avenue, near the business center.

On the special train that has been bearing the colonel around the country during the last weeks is a squad of newspaper men of first rank in the profession.

"In Denver, there is no hospitality. The town as we found it was marked by a complete disregard for the conventionalities of etiquette, and there seemed to be no respect for the feelings of strangers.
