

CIRCUS SUNDAYS IN OMAHA

Forepaugh-Sells Bros. Aggregation Will Reach Here This Morning.

FEATURES OF THE GREAT SHOW

Four Special Trains Bring an Army of People and Animals to Camp Over Sunday and Exhibit Monday.

Another circus is coming! A real circus! A big one! Among the very largest that travels and exhibits under ten big tents.

The four special trains will roll into Omaha bright and early this morning and the great white city will soon be looking like a camp ground.

About 2,000 meals are served every day in the wonderful canvas hotel on the show grounds of the Adams Forepaugh and Sells brothers' circus.

The show also carries its own postoffice. Letters are received daily from every corner of the globe.

There is also a hospital, library, electric lighting plant. The management also maintains its own police force, lawyers, doctors, dentists and other professionals.

The home of this strange family of 1,000 people, 900 horses and 200 wild beasts is a train of several sections, the combined length of which is more than one mile.

This train in a single season travels on an average of 25,000 miles, stopping in about 200 towns and giving upwards of 400 performances.

Among the big acts are the Hines Kimball troupe, who are seen for the first time in America; the original Karl Handy company, Marie Meers of the Meers Sisters; the Riding Rooneys; the sixty-one menage and high school horses; Adia Bell Edwards' troupe of strong people from Australia, the Ty-Bell sisters, known as the Butterfly Aerialists, the Lowanders, and the new elephant stunt which employs a lot of collie dogs and elephants among the principal features.

The parade tomorrow morning will leave the show grounds at 10 o'clock and traverse the following route: Leave Twentieth and Paul street to Cummins street; east on Cummins to Sixteenth; south on Sixteenth to Douglas; east on Douglas to Twelfth; south on Twelfth to Farnam; west on Farnam to Fifteenth; south on Fifteenth to Jackson; west on Jackson to Sixteenth; north on Sixteenth to Cummins; west on Cummins to Twentieth; north on Twentieth to the show grounds.

LEADER OF COWBOY SHOWS COMES TO OMAHA THIS WEEK

Miller Brothers Great 101 Ranch Will Exhibit Here Twice on Thursday.

The 101 Ranch Wild West is the lustiest canvas youngster in the history of traveling amusements. Organized less than three years ago on the famous 101 ranch of Billie, Okl., it is already in the front rank of "white top" entertainers in the country.

They have aimed from the outset of their alliance to provide not merely a good, but the best show of its kind ever assembled under canvas.

Joseph C. Miller, president of the 101 ranch, and among the last of the cattle kings of the American west, is the central and conspicuous figure in the show.

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The vivid tournament provided in the summary of the west—the west before the long trails were blocked; before barbed wire traversed ranges; before the superb freedom of the employed plains was exchanged for the limits of exact ownership.

The two performances in this city on Thursday, September 22, will be inaugurated by a street parade, which will traverse the principal thoroughfares in the forenoon.

DOUGLAS COUNTY FAIR PLANS

Indications Are the Attendance Will Be Immense This Year.

INTEREST IN THE EXHIBITS

Different Prejects Are Vying with Each Other to See Which May Take the Greatest Number of Visitors.

Fully 200,000 persons will attend the annual fair of the Douglas County Agricultural society to be held September 28 to October 2, according to the predictions made today by the managers of the show.

"The attendance last year was fully 200,000 a day, and at times more," said G. W. Harvey, secretary of the society, yesterday.

"There is every indication that this year it will be at least 25,000 a day on an average, and very likely more."

"Interest in the fair has never before in the half century of the society's history been as keen as it is today. We have secured a long list of entrants, and there are going to be a good many records for fine showings broken."

"Throughout the county, the new department open to boys and girls have attracted much attention, and I am sure that these departments, which have been made to conform with those of the state fair will be among the most successful divisions."

"For the boys, we have several important contests, including the acre contest, the ear to row contest, the ten ear selection, the one ear exhibit in corn, and the acre and size of seed piece contest for potatoes, as well as the special \$60 pro rata corn prize."

TO CHANGE FOREST RESERVE

Petition for Opening Large Tract Near Rapid City, S. D., to Homeowners.

RAPID CITY, S. D., Sept. 17.—(Special.)—Petitions asking for a change in the boundary of the Black Hills forest reserve are being circulated in Rapid City and Pennington county.

The east line of the reserve now runs six miles west of Rapid City. The petition asks for the change of the line so it will run near Silver City, twenty-five miles west of Rapid City.

If this petition is granted by the government it will throw open for settlement many fine valleys and will lead to the settlement of the hills country west of Rapid City.

At this time there are few people living in the hills west of this city, but the territory in question is capable of sustaining a large number of people and it will be but a short time in settling up.
