NEW PASTOR AT FIRST M. E.

Rev. R. Scott Hyde of Hanson Park Methodist Closes Pastorate There Sunday Morning, Then to Chicago.

A special religious service with full choir will be held at Temple Israel Sunday morning at 10:30. Rabbi Leo M. Franklin of Detroit, who has been transferred to Philadelphia, will occupy the pulpit and deliver an address on "The American Jew; a History and a Prophecy."

School Bond Issue.

OMAHA, Sept. 23.—To the Editor of The Bee: I read the fine tribute to the Omaha schools and Dr. W. M. Davidson. The teachers have a good reason to praise the Omaha schools, for they are the best paid in the country, with the least work. I notice that Dr. Davidson is a strong advocate of another bonding of the city for \$150,000. How about the home owners, who are losing their little homes by tax sales? Watch the advertised tax sales. I do not know how much the doctor pays to Omaha schools in taxes, but this is sure: The only way for the taxpayer to break even and have anything for old age is to either start a saloon, a church or school of some kind to get out of taxes, like the business colleges, and I would suggest an academy to teach milking a cow and raising chickens for both boys and girls. We have too much theory for our practical and bread-winning abilities. The school board has had its own way about long enough. It paid \$500 each for twelve lots north of Fort street, that were selling two years ago for \$100 to \$200 for the best one, and these the board bought no one wanted and at any price. It is easy to spend the people's money and if there is not a lot up on mortgaging our homes by submitting the voting of bonds to the people who do not pay any of the tax, we will be in the same hole we were twenty years ago, and thus set Omaha back ten years.
