Market Exhibits More Life, with Increasing Breadth and Strength.

READING SHOWS MORE STRENGTH

Hardening Tendency of Money Rate Ignored in Conviction Causes Are Temporary and Lie in Preparations for Settlement.

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—The stock market today gave signs of more life and took on a semblance of breadth and strength. The increased congestion of the dealings in Reading as the day progressed, however, lessened the appearance of breadth and restored that of narrow professionalism, which has been the fault of the market for some time. The conspicuous strength of Reading at first was made an argument in favor of the general advance, but later became the grounds for some doubt and hesitation over the general movement as the professional operations engrossed an increasing proportion of the whole market.

The hardening tendency of money rates was ignored in the conviction that the causes for it were temporary and lay in the preparations for the October settlements. In Berlin, especially, the necessities of the payments loom large. The advance in the official rate of the Impertal Bank of Germany, while predicted, was made a full 1 per cent to 5 per cent instead of the expected 4% per cent. The private discount rate rose only ½ per cent to 4% per cent, but the private discount rate in London made a sharper response, the rate for three-months' bills getting above the official bank rate. An advance in the bank rate on Thursday under these circumstances would not cause surprise.

The placing in London of \$7,000,000 of Union Pacific refunding bonds neutralized the influence of the London money market on the stock market here.
