

Big Savings Are Made in Uncle Sam's Expenses

Ten Million Dollars is Taken from Estimates as Result of Taft's Efforts.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—President Taft's "house party" at which his cabinet advisers were guests, broke up today.

The president himself will leave the White House tomorrow at 10 a. m. for New York, where he is to make his first official speech of the campaign before the League of Republican Clubs at a banquet at Hotel Astor.

Mr. Taft has prepared this speech with great care and has gone over it several times with the members of his cabinet.

The cabinet has been sitting all week, most of the time being devoted to scaling the estimates of the various executive departments to be presented to congress at the next session.

A saving of nearly \$10,000,000 will be made in the appropriations for the War department as a result of the pruning of the estimates by the cabinet.

The total appropriation for the current fiscal year amounted to \$144,000,000, while the estimates for the next fiscal year will aggregate about \$137,000,000.

The great saving will be in river and harbor appropriations. For the present year these aggregated \$49,300,000, while the estimates provide for an expenditure of only \$39,000,000.

The military estimates proper, including the military academy and militia, exclusive of public works, is allotted about \$12,000,000 as against \$7,300,000 for the current year, but this is explained by the fact that the army is nearly 7,000 men short of its full quota, which must be maintained.

Missionary to the Kiowa Indians at First Baptist.

Rev. Paul H. Gramman of the State University to discuss "Goethe's Faust" at Unity Church this Morning.

Rev. H. H. Clouse, missionary to the Kiowa Indians, will preach at the morning service at the First Baptist church.

His subject will be "The Story of the Kiowa Mission." The missionary will have with him three Kiowa Indians—Tobeyo, Jack Wolf and Sanequo—who will sing native songs and speak through an interpreter.

The American Bible society has just added to its interesting list of versions of the scriptures in the languages of the North American Indians, a translation of the book of Genesis and the Gospel of Mark into the language of the Navajos.

This is the first publication of the translation of the scriptures into the tongue of these people. The version has been prepared by the Rev. Leonard P. Brink of Totowa, New Mexico, connected with the southwest Indian conference, an interdenominational mission at work in that region. There are said to be 25,000 Navajos in the United States, and there are at present Baptist, Methodist, Presbyterian, Christian Reformed, Gospel Union, and independent missions at work among them. These scriptures will help in the education of the people and in the formation of a Navajo literature.
