

COMING CUBAN ELECTION WILL TELL CUBA'S PROGRESS

Hope Expressed that It May Accomplished Without Fraud by Citizens.

HAVANA, Oct. 3.-With the approach of the elections on November 1-the second held by a Cuban government without American supervision—there has been per ceptible a growing hope that what remains of the campaign and the electoral struggle may be passed without serious disorders. The first Cuban election, that of 1901, at which President Estrada Palma was elected for a second term, was confessedly carried by fraud. This led directly to the revolution of August, 1906, the overthrow of the Palma administration and the second American intervention, which continued under the governor-generalship of Charles P. Magoon, until General Jose Miguel Gomez, who had been elected president at an election hald in 1908, under the supervision of Colonel Crowder and other American inaugurated president of the restored re-

public on January 28, 1909. Most of the candidates for the various offices have now been nominated and in Havana alone there are no less than five parties in the field. These are the liberal party (Zavaists), the historic liberal party (Niguelists), the independent liberal party (headed by General Nunez), the workingmen's party, and the party of young Cuba.

#### MINE WRECKED BY DYNAMITE

Explosive Used for Powder May Have Caused Palu Disaster.

SEVENTY-TWO MEN ENTOMBED

Resens Work Proceeds Slowly Recause of Poisonous Gases-No Hope of Men Being Yet

MONTEREY, Mex., Oct. 3.-Latest news from the coal mine at Palu, where the explosion occurred Friday night, indicates that the loss of life will probably be seventy-two miners, mostly Mexicans and Japanese. Only two bodies have thus far been recovered, owing to the presence of polsonous gases.

The cause of the explosion has not yet been acurately determined, but the indicaions are that it was caused by miners stead of using the safety powder furnished by the company.

The force of the explosion blew down all of the timbers in the stope from the sixth officers of Governor Magoon's cabinet, was lift to the surface. It blew out the mouth of the stope, lifting twenty feet of surface and closing the mine. The fan house was also blown down, but the fan and engine were not injured.
