Prices on Board of Trade.

CHICAGO, Oct. 4.—Drouth damage in Argentina alleged to have wiped out 25 per cent of the wheat crop there forced a much higher level of prices today in Chicago for that cereal. As a rule, traders here were caught on the wrong side of the market. The close was at a net advance of 1014c. In both corn and oats final sales showed a rise of 1024c to 30c ompared with last night. Provisions finished unchanged to 30c up.

The wheat market was in prime condition for a rally when the news from Argentina came out. Considerable wheat had been sold short here of late at low figures and the sellers were nervous about

Argentina came out. Considerable wheat had been sold short here of late at low figures and the sellers were nervous about it. Reports of 150,000 bushels decrease in the European visible supply formed a strong contrast with an increase of 11,400,000 bushels a year ago. Frimary receipts only half those of twelve months previous added to the tension on the part of shorts. Then too flour business was exhibiting improvement and European markets were generally higher. The buils got little comfort from a gain of 60,288,600 bushels in the world's stocks, as during the same week last year there had been an increase of 117,200,000 bushels. Each dip in prices was followed by an upturn until the tone of the trade changed, and a genuine buying flurry had control of the pit when the gong shut off the eager bidding. December ranged from \$5,4997/4c, and closed 19,000 to the trade changed, with the feeling decidedly firm.

The corn market showed strength all day, December selling between \$9,5c and 100,6c, and closing steady \$4,500 up at 500,000. Cash corn finished firm with No 2 yellow at \$18,000c.

Judge Pollock Dissolves Injunction Against Operation of Kansas Gunranty Act.

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 4.-Federal Judge Pollock, in the United States circuit court in Kansas City, Kan., today made an order directing that the mandate of the United States court of appeals dissolving the inunction against the operation of the Kansas bank deposit guaranty law be spread on the records of his court.

The order was made on the application of Fred S. Jackson, attorney general of Kansas, and because of the order the law which has been suspended several months by injunction proceedings is again in force, Judge Pollock granted the injunction that

suspended the operation of the law, At the time of the suspension of the law 398 of the 900 state banks of Kansas had taken advantage of its provisions.
