The house of Braganza, to which the dynasty of Portugal belongs, dates from the latter part of the fourteenth century, when Alfongo, an illegitimate son of King John, was created by King Alfonzo V. Duke of Braganza. The old line of Portuguese kings of the house of Avis became extinct in 1578 by the death of King Sebastine, "the Desired,' and of Cardinal Henrique, his successor, and Philip II. of Spain, by reason of his descent from a Portuguese prin cess, became king of Portugal.

The Spanish dynasty lasted sixty years, at the end of which period the Portuguese revolted and proclaimed Don Joan, was then Duke of Braganza, as their king. This was in 1640, and from that time until now the house of Braganza has held the throne without a break, seventeen rulers wearing the crown in the 270 years between the accession of John IV., "the Restorer." in 1640, and the dethronement of King
