Fong was taken across the bay on a ferryboat and hurried to Moffitt's offices, where he confessed his intention to assassinate Prince Tsai Hsun. A five-chainbered revolver, fully loaded, was found in his pocket. The arrest was made so quickly and quietly that neither Prince Tsai or anyone of his retinue nor any, member of the reception party knew of it until the steamer was ready to sail. Then Rear Admiral Thomas S. Phelps, repres senting the government of the United States in the final ceremonies attending the visitors' departure, was informed by Moffitt of what had happened. Whether the prince was told of his close escape from death was not learned.

In his statement to secret service men Fong denied tonight that his action was the result of a conspiracy. He said that the organization to which he belonged, while revolutionary in tendency, is in no way responsible for his attempt to slay the

Fong expressed regret that he had not accomplished his purpose, saying that he wanted to be a martyr to the cause to which he had consecrated his life, and that he wanted to awaken his countrymen. He said he would have considered it an honor to have been put to death had he accomplished what he set out to do. The would-be assassin said he hesitated

before drawing his revolver because the crowd had closed in around the royal party. and he did not desire to injure anyone except Prince Tsal. It was at that moment that Moffitt and McMahon seized him. Fong is a native of San Francisco. He has been living in Berkeley, where he was employed as cook in a fraternity house. In his statement to the authorities Fong. who speaks good English, said:

"I tried to kill Prince Tsai Hsun, because he is an enemy of my people. I did the best I could, but my work in this particular case is over for a while. It will be taken up again elsewhere. I can assure
