FLYNN RUNS OUT OF CASH

Street Commissioner Reports Condition Due to Snow.

HE ASKS TO BE REIMBURSED

Committee of Whole Turns Down Proposed Law to Bar Children from Shows After Nine-Voting Machines.

Another city department has run short of funds, and Tom Flynn, street commisdoner, wants to be reimbursed for \$2,138 which he has expended in getting 4.876 city blocks cleared of weeds. Mr. Flynn said in his report to the council committee of the whole Monday afternoon that the heavy mows of last winter made him run behind bla street cleaning funds and that the work of weed cutting does not properly ome under his department. The council has in previous years reimbursed him for this work if he ran out of funds because of it and this year's case was referred to te committee on finance. The money to pay for cutting weeds came originally from the funds of the health department, but hat department could not afford to darry the burden.

Councilman Schroeder's ordinance to keep children out of moving ploture shows after o'clock failed of support. The councilmen were generally of the opinion that the reform Mr. Schroeder was aiming at was needed, but that the present curfew law yould cover the case if it could be enforced. nuncilman Bridges objected to the law on he ground of interference and stated that ie would send his children anywhere he deased at any hour.

M. F. Punkhouser, chairman of the committee on supplies, explained the action of that committee in ordering three new voting machines without authorization. He said that the city has fifty-four machines now and cannot safely use those without having the three more so that every one of the fifty-seven precincts could be voted in the same manner. The council will take action at the regular meeting and will probably authorize the purchase. All the bids recently received for fur-

nishing material for the heating plant at the asphalt repair shop were rejected. J. J. Hanighen, the lowest bidder, failed to submit a certified check with his bid, thus making it illegal and the next lowest, C. H. Kessler, was \$178.25 higher. In the opinion of the city engineer the bids were too high with the exception of the illegal one and it was decided to readvertise. Mr. Hanighen's bid was \$474 and Mr. Kessler's
