WASHINGTON, Oct. 28-If a husband eats his wife till she is bruised and bleeding, even crippled for life, should she be allowed to sue him for damages or would such suits violate the sanctity of the come and tend to break up civilization? Such a question was laid today before the supreme court of the United States for its

Jessie E. Thompson, wife of Charles N. Phompson, both then living in the District of Columbia, sued her husband for \$70,000 damages for seven alleged assaults upon The nature of the alleged assaults and injuries were never brought out in open court, because before the suit came to trial the court had given judgment in favor of the accused, on the plea that at the time of the alleged assault the par-

ties were husband and wife. It is probably the first time that the supreme court has had to pass directly upon such a case. While its decision will not be binding in jurisdictions other than the District of Columbia, states having similar laws to the District of Columbia 550 in this particular, such as New York, Maine, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Minnesota and lowa, will be concerned in the outcome of the litigation.
