

CHICAGO STRIKE IS SETTLED

Garment Workers' Union and Employers Reach an Agreement.

WILL RESUME WORK MONDAY

Porty Thousand Persons Are Affected and Numerous Small Riots Grew Out of Trouble, Which Lasted Several Days.

CHICAGO, Nov. 5 .- The garment workers strike which called out 40,000 persons in the clothing trade and which was productive of numerous small riots, was settled this afternoon. It is expected the strikers will return to their machines on Monday. Announcement of the settlement of the strike came from the offices of Hart, Shaffner & Marx, whose shops have been in the vortex of the trouble. Jane Addams of Hull House and National President Rickert of the Garment Workers were active in the negotiations. The strike was called for the purpose of compelling recognition of the union

In advance of official statements it was learned that the employers and strikers will each appoint a member of a committee to consider grievances and that these two will select a third. The committee wil merely consider working conditions, compensation, etc.
