Total bank clearings for the wouth of October, according to the regular monthly statement compiled by R. G. Dus & Co., which includes returns from 115 leading centers in the United States, aggregate \$12,788,417,708, a decrease of 13.1 per cent. as compared with the corresponding month last year. The loss is due in greater part to the continued reduced volume of exchanges at New York City, although in this respect some improvement is disescuible over the two preceding menths. Returns from cities ontside New York are comparatively favorable, the gain in the total of these comparing with a less in September. There is, however, more or less irregularity, it being noticeable that while in practically every section exchanges at some of the leading centers show decided increase, at others there is little or no improvement, or losses are reported. As the points where the volume of exchanges is in decreased amount are in decided minority, it would appear that the losses may be due to special causes and reflect but little the business situation as a whole. In the New England States the returns still exhibit a loss, due in large part to decreased exchanges at Boston and several manufacturing centers. A few cities report gains, among them Woromter, Portland, Hariford and New Haven. In the Middle Atlantic States gains are reported by a number of important cities, among them Pittaburg, Scranton, Buffale, Albany, Rochester and Binghamten, but at numerous points there are losses. Increases reported ever last year by numerous important cities in the South Atlantic States reflect continued progress throughout the greater part of that section, Baltimere, Washington, Atlasta and Jacksonville all reporting good gains, while in no instance where there is a less is it especially significant. Generally satisfactory conditions throughout the Central South are indicated by increases at many points, though at the larger cities conditions in the cotton market contribute to a slight reduction in the volume of bank clearings. In the Middle West the total of exchanges shows a small decrease because of the leases at Chicago, Cineinnati and a few less important points, but as a rule they are smaller than in Septemher. Gains are reported at numerous manufacturing centers, among which are Cleveland, Detrets, Milwaukee, Indianapolia, Toledo, Peoria, Grand Rapida, Youngetown, Akron, Canton, Rockferd, Bloomington and others. In the Far West the returns are not so good as in recent preceding menths, there being more or less decrease, compared with last year, at several leading centers, such as Minneapolis, St. Paul and St. Joseph. A number of cities make gains, among them Kansas City, Omaha, Wichita, Sloux City, Topeka, Davenpert, Oedar Rapida and Sloux Falls. On the Pacific Slope generally satisfactory conditions are still prevalent, many of the most important cities reporting a marked increase in the volume of bank clearings over last year. The comparison with 1906 is still extremely favorable, almost every city showing marked increase. 
