TAFT WILL RUSH HIS LEGISLATION

Conference of Cabinet Brings Out Views of President and the Official Family.

MOST HARM DONE IN THE EAST

Outcome in West Considered Already Discounted in Primaries.

DEFEAT MAY WORK FOR GOOD

Some Comfort Found in Relative Smallness of Pluralities.

NEW POSTAL PLAN IMPORTANT

Measure to Meet Second-Class Mail Abuses Requiring Magazines to Pay Increased Postage on Advertising Discussed.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 9.—The election and its lessons and the pressing forward of the administration's legislative program so as to get it out of the way before the accession of democratic control in congress next year was discussed at a cabinet meeting today.

Featuring the administrative measures will be the plan for meeting second class mail abuses by requiring magazines—not newspapers—to pay increased postage on advertising pages sufficient to eliminate postal deficits and warrant one-cent postage on first class mail soon. The plan will be urged on congress at the coming short session and several magazine publishers already have expressed a disposition to cooperate.

Individual Views Expressed.

The discussion of the election results brought out individual views of the president and some of his official family.

It was pointed out that in the east the most real harm to the republican party was accomplished much of the outcome in the west having been discounted in the primaries. Some comfort was found in the relative smallness of the democratic pluralities, as compared with the past when democratic primacy was attained. New York was apparently less than 70,000 plurality being cited.

The expressed view was that the defeat of the party might in reality work for good.

President Taft realizes the necessity for getting through all needed administration legislation in the three months' session beginning next month.

Bristow is Pleased in Kansas

Governor Stubbs Re-Elected in Face of Terrific Fight.

SALINA, Kan., Nov. 9.—United States Senator Joseph L. Bristow, who took an active part in the recent campaign for the insurgents, said today of yesterday's results:

"I am very much gratified at the result in Kansas. We have elected the entire republican congressional delegation by majorities ranging from 1,000 to 3,000."

"Governor Stubbs has been re-elected in face of the most terrific fight that has been made on any republican nominee for governor since 1882, when Governor St. John was defeated for a third term. While Governor Stubbs' victory is greatly reduced from that of two years ago, the fact that he won in face of tremendous forces arrayed against him, marks his election as a great victory."

"With the returns from every other state showing reduced republican representation in congress the result in Kansas should be highly gratifying, not only to the republicans of this state, but to the entire nation."

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—Mayor Gaynor today said he was gratified with the result of yesterday's elections.

"I do not view the result in a partisan spirit, or with a mere feeling of elation," said the mayor.

"I see in it a re-adjustment of those voters throughout the country who are too intelligent to remain mere thick-and-thin partisans. The intelligence of the country is asserting itself and business men and property owners will again divide themselves normally between the parties as formerly and as they do in other countries."

President Taft Will Not Discuss Champ Clark Election Result

Expected It

Candidate for Speaker Says that Democratic Victory is Due to Dissatisfaction with Tariff.

BOWLING GREEN, Mo., Nov. 9.—Downward revision of the tariff at once is the pledge made for the new democratic house of representatives by Champ Clark, congressman from the Ninth district, who is a candidate for the speakership.

"The landslide is in line with my predictions of months ago," said Congressman Clark at his home. "The people are tired of the present administration and are provoked to just the extent that the returns indicate with the tariff bill."

"The first and greatest proposition the democrats should stand for is a reduction in the tariff to a revenue basis. I could reduce it scientifically and gradually and put into it a sliding scale much like there was in the tariff bill of 1892."

WICHITA, Kan., Nov. 9.—Congressman Victor Murdock said today:

"I read in the congressional election news a plain and unmistakable command of the people in congress to take more power away from the speaker. Virtually every republican classed as an insurgent, who was running for re-election to the house, has been returned."

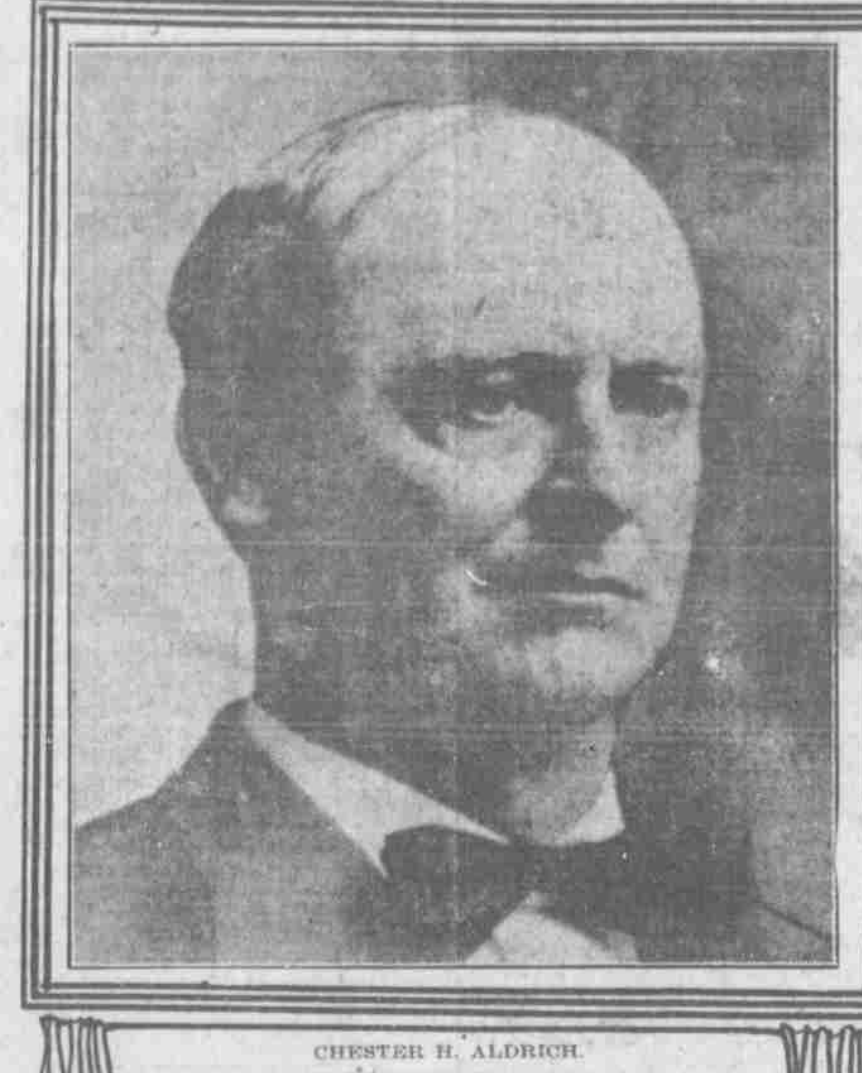
NEW JERSEY

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DEMOCRATIC MAJORITY 29

Republicans Will Have 164 Members in Sixty-Second Congress.

EIGHT SEATS IN MINORITY NOW

Democrats Elect Two Hundred and Twenty-Five Members—One Socialist—One Doubtful—Few Changes Possible.

Completion of 62d Congress.

Democrats elected 225

Republicans elected 164

Socialists elected 1

Doubtful district 1

Total 391

Majority of house 196

Democratic majority in house 29

Complete returns on the election of representatives in congress indicate that the democrats will have a working majority of 29 in the next house.

CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—The number of democrats elected to congress, according to the latest returns, which are of an unofficial character, is 225. The republican representation will be 164 or 165, or eight seats less than the democrats now have in the sixty-first congress.

The Eleventh Pennsylvania district, which is represented in the sixty-first congress by a republican, is in doubt. The Twelfth Pennsylvania district, also normally republican, is likewise doubtful.
