

On the other hand, the effectiveness of the democratic majority in the lower house will be largely nullifed with the hold the republicans still retain in the

senate. A striking feature of the voting through out the country was the repudiation of republican leaders in their own homes. Vice President Sherman's home town, Utica, went democratic by several hundred. Sereno Payne's home city, Auburn, defeated him by 800 votes, although the rural districts round about came to his rescue and made his seat secure for another term. In New York City, Congressman William g S. Bennett was beaten by Henry George Congressman J. Slay Passett of Elmira, who went down to defeat in 1861
