"No, I did not," replied the court. "It was necessary that I go on as long as the plaintiff required it. He drops the proceedings now and is making no further effort to get the note here. That was the purpose of the hearing."

Action was taken by the Central Labor union Friday evening toward making construction work on skyscrapers safer for the workmen.
