

Regret is expressed by navni officers in Washington that some among their German fellow sallors should criticize the Navy department for failing to include German ports in the itinerary of the Atlantic fleet now visiting France and England. It is explained at the Navy department that there was no disposition to discriminate against German ports in making up the dinerary. The original plan was for the fleet to make a flying visit to the Mediterranean and it was not contemplated the ships would go to northern Europe. But the appearance of cholera in the Italian seaports and disturbed political conditions in other south European countries made it necessary to change the program and the fleet was diverted to England and France.
