The telegram followed a conference of railroad presidents, in which Darius Miller, B. L. Winchell, H. E. Mudge and F. A. Delano are known to have participated in the discussion of the proposition. It was signed by O. L. Dockeson, who was authorized to speak for the western railroad presidents interested in the cases before the Interstate Commerce commission.

"Louis D. Brandels: It is reported you have stated before the Interstate Commerce commission that American railways are wasting \$1,000,000 dally. if you can point out a practical way by which a substantial portion of this amount may be saved, several western railroads would be pleased to tender you employment, allowing you to name your own salary.

"This proposition is made to you in the same spirit of sincerity in which you rendered your statement to the commission."

Scientifie Principles Discussed. WASHINGTON, Nov. 22.—Today's session of the Interstate Commerce commismion consisted mostly of discussion of the scientific management of railroads by expert witnesses. This line of testimony was closed late in the afternoon and the commission adjourned until Friday.

Attorney Brandels for the Atlantic seaboard shippers, in summing up the scientific management testimony of his witness, reiterated his request that the commissio conduct an independent investigation if it pelieves that the railroads have not introduced such scientific methods, and he believed that he had produced evidence to show they had not. He said the railroads' use of the recent wage increases as ar excuse for rate increases pointed to an increase of the burdens of the American public."

He called attention to what he described as a prediction of the heads of the great trunk lines that the pending increases were only an earnest of what is to come; that the public is to expect and become accustomed to a progressive rise in rates throughout the country.

Mr. Brandels assumed the burden of proof was on the railroads to show whether they have put into operation economies which he did not believe existed and that those economies should first be practiced before resorting to advances.

Going Tells of Saving. Charles B. Going, managing editor of an engineering magazine, told of the Atchison Topeka & Santa Fe railroad affecting a net saving of \$5,300,000 in five years in its repair and machine shops through func-

ness Men's league of St. Louis, introduced as a witness P. W.
