Wheat Opens Firm, but Trading Dull - Argentine Promises. CORN BULLS ARE KEEPING BUSY

Movement Continues Light and Covering by Shorts Holds Values Up - Cash Situation Continues Strong Through Week.

OMAHA, Dec. 2, 1910. - Wheat opened firm, but trading was dull, a little easier feeling resulting from an increased estimate by Buenos Aires of the exportable surplus from Argentina.

Primary wheat receipts were 167,000 bu. and shipments were 137,000 bu., against receipts last year of 27,000 bu. and shipments of 1,027,000 bu.

Chicago Grain and Provisions Features of the Trading and Closing Prices on the Board of Trade.

CHICAGO, Dec. 2. - Wall street weakness continued here today in the wheat market. The close was heavy, at the lowest point of the season, although last night's figures in corn the finish was 1/4c to 1/2c up, oats, 1/4c to 1/2c lower.

Conditions in the stock market led to unexpected weakness in wheat, but other news was strong and large shorts were covering. The argument was that the downward trend in corn, although a different business in other directions, and that it was no time to buy anything.

Notwithstanding active buying of oats the market finally yielded under sales by some of the large houses. May was sold at 34c to 34 1/2c and closed 1/2c up at 34 1/2c.

Receipts attributed to packers, forced producers to share in the general late reaction. Pork in the case of May was sold at 17 1/2c to 17 3/4c and 17 1/2c to 17 3/4c.
