WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—(Special).—Mrs. Henry F. Dimmock of New York, president of the George Washington Memorial association, has set her heart upon having erected in the national capital a convention hall to be known as the Washington Memorial hall, to cost in the neighborhood of \$2,000,000.

Train brakes have been perfected for freight equipment and the strength of the "drafting" greatly increased.

The heavy switch engines employed by the Rock Island and other roads, having six drivers and no trucks, have a tractive force of 30,000 pounds.

The boiler tubes of the new engine are twenty-four feet long. The wheels show the 2-8-2 arrangement, which means that there are two sets of eight drive wheels each, with two two-wheeled trucks.

The total weight of the locomotive, exclusive of the tender, is more than 36 tons. The sixteen drivers carry 180 tons.

Why build such leviathans? Because the Mallet engine will haul more than two locomotives, each of half its weight, with half the number of men. On account of the number of wheels the weight upon each is not excessive.
