### Miller Children to Stay in Omaha Until Case is Heard

Judge Estelle Decides to Keep Children in This Jurisdiction Pending Hearing.

Defeated in the first engagement of the war between Mr. and Mrs. William Coulter of Broken Bow, Neb., on the one side and Theodore Miller of Omaha on the other for custody of Mr. Miller's two small children, when Judge Lee E. Estelle over-ruled a motion to quash the habeas corpus writ under which the children were taken from the Coulters, H. M. Sullivan, attorney for the Broken Bow couple, in the district court Friday morning asked the judge to at least permit the children to return to Broken Bow and live with their foster parents pending hearing and final ruling in the matter. Judge Estelle denied this request and ordered that the children remain in custody of Mr. Miller until the case is finally determined. The court set the hearing for December 13. Mr. Sullivan left for Broken Bow, saying that he and the Coulters will be on hand to fight when the time comes.

Alleging that when his wife died five years ago Mr. and Mrs. Coulter took the children and later secured a decree of adoption in the Custer county court, Mr. Miller secured a habeas corpus writ from Judge Estelle last week and Sheriff Straley went to Broken Bow, secured the children, and brought them to Omaha.

At a hearing Thursday Mr. Sullivan moved to quash the writ on the ground that the children were not in the jurisdiction of the court when it was secured. He set up the argument that the action should have been in the Custer county district court.

After the motion to quash had been overruled, Mr. Sullivan made his request for temporary custody. Judge Estelle said that while he does not doubt that the Coulters have given and would give the children a good home he believes they should be kept in this jurisdiction until the case is determined.

Edward T. Miller, the older child, who is 2, prefers to remain with his father in Omaha, while the girl, Anna, aged 4, would return to the Coulters.

Edward said Friday that Mrs. Coulter told him to pray to God to have him go back to her. "I would rather stay here with my father," he said, "but I pray to go back every night because she told me to, and I must obey her orders. I should like to be in both places, but I would rather be with my father."

### Joseph Baldrige Proposes to Play at Santa Claus

Has a Regular Stunt He Does at the Yuletide Each Year for the Children.

If in the course of a few days a mere acquaintance should see Joseph Baldrige, the insurance man, buying quantities of toys, dolls and games, it should not be inferred that he is the father of a family of Rooseveltian size, for he is not—Mr. Baldrige is a bachelor.

He will be buying these toys, if he follows again his custom of several years, for the children of the Child Saving Institute, the Santa Claus of the institution.

Many men and women, and also some more fortunately situated, co-operate in making Christmas happy for the orphans. Last year the four children of E. G. Solomon made thirty sacks of mixed candy, popcorn and nuts, which were hung on the two Christmas trees, brightening the institute at holiday time. The Solomon children made the sacks, cooked the candy and popped the corn themselves.

Another adult contributor for several years is Harry Hunter. Teachers of the public schools have generally given the tree which have been used previously in school exercises and which come to the institute arrayed in all that splendor of ornament which does not seem cheap tinsel or tawdry gew-gaw to the youthful eye, particularly to the eye of a little orphan boy or girl.

### QUESTION OF JURISDICTION

Courts Asked to Decide Whether Interstate or State Rates Take Precedence.

Whether the Interstate Commerce commission rulings regarding freight tariffs or the laws of Nebraska are superior must be determined by Judge Howard Kennedy of the law division of the district court, when he rules in the case of the Katz-Craig Construction company against the Omaha railroad, trial of which was commenced Friday afternoon. The railroad charged the construction company \$1.18 for hauling 600 carloads of stone from Chicago to Omaha, Neb. The construction company claims that under rulings of the Interstate Commerce commission this charge was 50 per cent too high. The railroad contends that the rate is one fixed by the Nebraska statute.

Charles S. Elguter represents the plaintiff, C. C. Wright of Chicago, general solicitor for the road, formerly of Omaha, and Frank Gaines represent the defendant.

### DISPUTED ROAD IS OPENED

Interested Property Owners Decide to Pay the Difference in Controversy.

Trouble over the disagreement of Mrs. Mary Cassidy and children and the Board of County Commissioners regarding the sum the Cassidy family should be paid for property taken from them for the opening of Forty-fourth street from L to Q streets, South Omaha, was ended Friday, when South Omaha citizens who desired the road opened at once paid the Cassidy's \$200 that was the difference between them and the commissioner. The commissioners were willing to pay \$70; the Cassidy's wanted \$1,500, but finally said they would accept \$1,000. The commissioners would not meet this offer, so the property owners desiring the road raised the difference. The road was opened Friday.
