In the first nine days receipts of grain by the Omaha Grain exchange the local market is just an even 500 cars ahead of the similar period last year. To date receipts have been 607 cars; last year they

"If this rate keeps up," said Frank B. Manchester, secretary of the exchange, "the current year will be well ahead of 1909. When the first of November came the exchange was 337 cars behind. We dropped a little further behind last month, but have made all this up in the first nine days of this month. So if there is a continued large gain, and there is every prospect of one, the new year may start with a good record behind it."

The receipts of 697 cars is not prodigious in itself, but is large for this time of year. Farmers are parting readily with wheat, but seem loath to let go of corn.
