TALK ON INTERESTING SUBJECTS

Whitelock, Secretary of American Bar Association, to Talk on Ex-Presidents When State Association Comes Here.

George Whitelock of Baltimore, secretary of the American Bar association, has made definite promise to attend the annual gathering of members of the Nebraska Bar association in Omaha. To this effect was received Saturday by Ralph W. Breckenridge, a fellow member of the national association's executive committee.

Whitelock, said Mr. Breckenridge, "has written that he will not read a paper on 'Uniform State Laws,' as at first expected, but on what will be to the public at large a more interesting theme. He will talk of the ex-presidents of the United States. He says there have been nineteen of these, though two died so soon after leaving the White House that they hardly count. Of the remaining seventeen all but two were lawyers and their lives after leaving the presidential chair will, therefore, be subject highly interesting to attorneys and a quite appropriate theme for discussion at a meeting of the Nebraska Bar association.

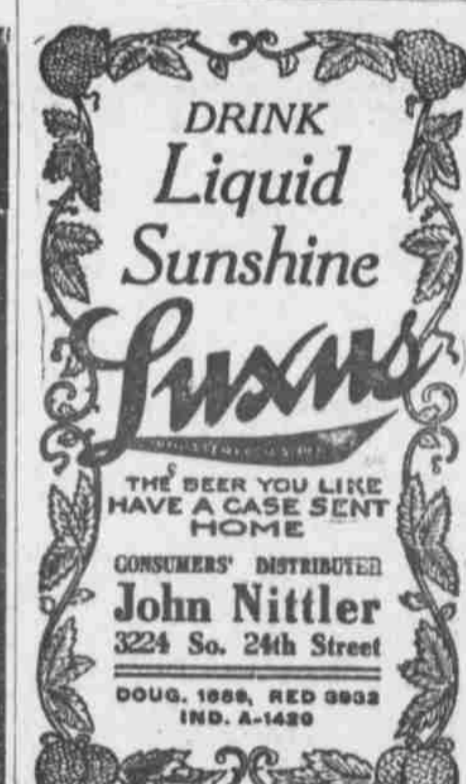
