SHIPPERS READY TO FIGHT

Meet to Prepare for Any Move the Railroads May Make.

SEVERAL CITIES REPRESENTED

Will Employ Legal Aid to Protect Rights Against Any Raise in Rates by the Railroads.

Shippers of the Missouri river cities are preparing to meet a fresh attempt of the railroads to raise rates from the seaboard. The three-year fight which the shippers won by decision of the United States supreme court is in large measure to be fought all over again. Preparatory to this shipping interests met in Omaha Thursday morning for conference. Sloux City, Kansas City, St. Joseph and Omaha men took part in the conference, which was held all day in the Commercial club. These four commissioners and secretaries of the several chambers of commerce and traffic bureaus of the commercial clubs were present: H. G. Wilson, Kansas City; H. G. Krake, St. Joseph; O. T. Bell, Sloux City; E. J. McVann, Omaha. Omaha was also represented by Arthur C. Smith and T. C. Byrne of the traffic bureau of the Commercial club, and Joseph Hayden was an attendant for a time. Shippers were also present from Kansas City, St. Joseph and Sloux City, but their names were not disclosed, because T. C. Byrne, chairman of the local traffic bureau, wished to suppress publication of any and all facts pertaining to the meeting. Mr. Byrne had been assured that the fact that a large conference was going on would inevitably become known to the railroads and that the detailed proceedings were a secret anyway. The necessity for the conference comes about in this wise: Interstate Ruling Expires. The Interstate Commerce commission's ruling was for a period of two years, and although final victory by the shippers came about in only recent months, yet the two years have been used up, as it were, in litigation through district United States court, where the railroads won an injunction and the United States supreme court, where the railroads were overruled. The rates fixed by the Interstate Com-

merce commission obtained during this period, but now the time is about up. A good deal of the time of the conference, in which about twenty men took part, was taken up with a debate on questions of legal counsel. Omaha wishes to have John Lee Webster employed. Mr. Webster is the man who really won the fight for the shippers and whose arguments before the federal district court were followed by the supreme court in making its decision. Kansas City succeeded in slipping in John Atwood thereafter and is again trying to get him landed as counsel. Omaha is again urging the talents of Mr. Webster. Probably only one attorney will be retained.

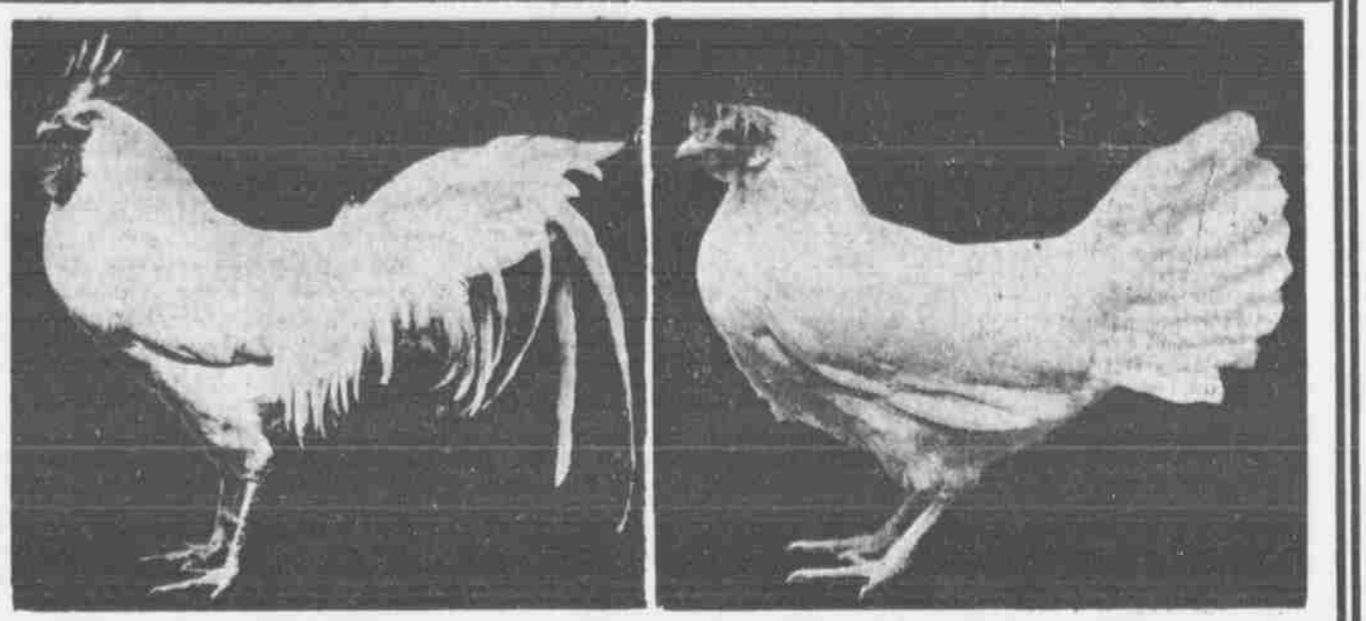
Judge Gives Baby Back to Her Mother Two Women in Grief

Ruling of Estelle Places Infant in Custody of Mrs. Bessie Pfiffer—Takes Child in Court.

Mrs. Bessie Pfiffer took her baby, Dorothy, from the arms of Mrs. Charles H. Coddling, the foster mother, in district court Thursday morning. Judge Estelle gave the mother her child by his finding in the habeas corpus action.

One woman was in tears at the parting, the other weeping for the joy of motherly love. The moment the judge ruled in favor of Mrs. Pfiffer the mother rose from her chair and started towards Mrs. Coddling, who was holding the infant in her arms in a far corner of the court room. Mrs. Pfiffer's foster mother, and Mrs. Pfiffer in testimony told the story of their family life.

Mrs. Pfiffer, but 19 years old, is a widow. She is working at the Courtney restaurant. The child was given into temporary custody of the Coddlings with the understanding that if by next March they would be permitted to adopt it, according to the witness, the next thing they knew the Coddling's told them that they had adopted the child in county court and the mother never again could have it. The Coddling's had Mrs. Bremmer place the child on the doorstep as they wanted him to think "the stork" had brought it. Mr. and Mrs. Coddling said they were

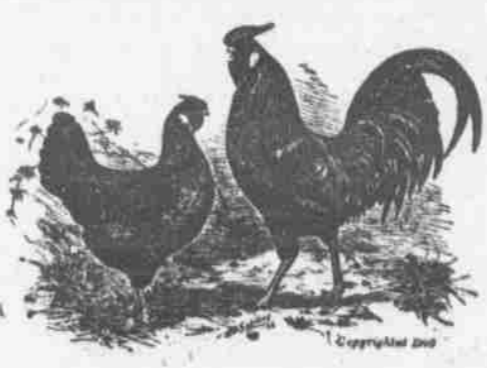
