Will Pay the Interest—Semi-annual interest on all Douglas county bonds except the new court house bonds will be paid January 1. The interest will amount to \$20,481. County Treasurer Frank A. Furay has asked the Board of County Commissioners to order a warrant for this sum drawn. Ashes Heavy Damages—Byron E. Ingelhart filed a petition asking \$10,000 damages of the street railway company for injuries sustained by his wife in a street car accident. Some months ago Mrs. Ingelhart sued the company for \$15,000 on identical grounds. The cause was tried a month ago and resulted in a disagreement. Solicitor Gets Judgment—Verdict for \$100 against the Royal Union Mutual Life Insurance company of Des Moines and in favor of Henry C. Compton was returned by a jury of the district court Friday. Compton sued for \$1,000 for commissions alleged to be due and unpaid. He formerly was a solicitor for the company. Rhoades, cashier of the United States National bank, closed a deal Friday whereby he becomes the owner of an acre and one-half in Fairacres. His purchase lies near the R. C. Fetters tract. Mr. Rhoades paid \$2,000 for his property. He is now the owner of a home in Dundee and will continue to reside there for a year or so, when he will build in Fairacres. Douglas County Helps Pay—Entertainment of the delegates at the annual meeting of the Nebraska Commissioners, Supervisors and Clerks' association in Omaha cost \$100, 1909. Mr. Rhoades was requested on order of the Board of County Commissioners. The balance was paid by members of the board as private citizens, the Commercial club and individuals interested in the holding of the meeting here. No. 13 from Omaha will leave here at 7:40 instead of 7 a. m. for Chicago and train No. 21 from Chicago has been discontinued. No. 1 for Sioux City will leave Missouri Valley at 8:55 a. m. instead of 6:55 a. m. Two new trains are put on. Train No. 32 leaves Omaha at 7 a. m. every morning for Carroll and returning train No. 31 leaves Carroll at 12:30 p. m. for Omaha. Can't Find Lobeck's Property—Sheriff's deputies have been unable to find sufficient property belonging to Charles O. Lobeck, congressman-elect from the First Nebraska district, to satisfy a county court judgment against Mr. Lobeck in favor of Erevilla L. Earl. The judgment is for \$221. Several days ago an execution for the amount was sent to the sheriff's office for service. It was returned to the office of the clerk of the district court Friday with the statement that no goods or chattels on which a levy could be made to satisfy the judgment could be found, though diligent search was made. Will Prosecute Each Other—Members of the Omaha Field Club District Improvement club are going to prosecute one another for failure to keep sidewalks clear of snow and ice this winter. The club is now making a copy of the city ordinance and a solemn warning to every member. 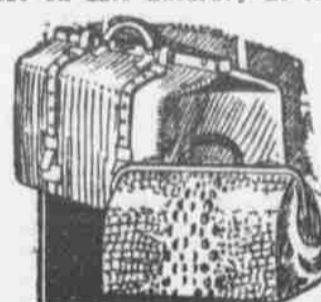
