WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—(Special to the Bee.)—The beginning of the new year is marked by an unusually large number of social functions among the official household in Washington. Taking first rank in the list are the White House dinners and the diplomatic breakfast which will be given tomorrow. Of the remaining dinners on the official calendar at the White House that to Secretary and Mrs. Knox will be one of the most important. This will be on January 5. The dinner to the secretary of the treasury and Mrs. McVeigh will be on January 9. Dinner to Attorney and Mrs. Wickersham will be given on January 12. The dinner to Postmaster General Hitchcock will be at master General Hitchcock will be at the White House on January 15. The secretary of the navy and Mrs. Meyer will be entertained by the president and Mrs. Taft at the White House February 2. On February 9 they will entertain Secretary of the Interior and Mrs. Bauckner. Secretary of Agriculture Wilson and Miss Wilson will be entertained February 15.
