Both the Standard Oll and the tobacco organizations contend that the power granted by the constitution to regulate interstate commerce is not extensive as to include regulation of the acquisition and ownership of a holding company of stock in other corporations. The government argues that whenever a olding company necessarily stifles or directly and substantially restricts free competition in commerce the United States has power to protect such commerce,

What is "Restraint?" In the contest regarding the answer to the question of "What is 'restraint' of trade or commerce?" the first dispute is over the interpretation of "restraint of trade" as equivalent to "the absence of free competition." The government advances the theolry that reduction of competition means a restraint on trade and consequently higher prices. The corporations urge that a combination of producers may mean a reduction of expenses and consequently lower prices.

The government further contends that the Sherman anti-trust law refers only to such restraints as are direct and material.
