IOWA CITY, Ia., Jan. 4.—(Special.)—Thomas, Murphy and Hyland, star players of the basketball quintet of the University of Iowa of one year ago, absolutely refuse to come out for practice this year and say that decidedly they will not join the squad this season. With this turn of affairs prospects for any sort of a winning team at the Hawkeye camp have been made particularly dim at present and a mere handful of candidates have appeared for practice under the teaching of Walter "Stub" Stewart, the newly chosen alumni coach of the basketball department. There seems to be a lack of enthusiasm throughout the department, so dissimilar from the gingery candor which marked the race for places on the team one year before.

MARYLAND CHAMPION SHOT

Armored Cruiser Wins Pennant in Battle Practiced of 1910, with Good Score.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—The armored cruiser Maryland is the champion shot of the United States navy. She won the pennant in the battle practice of 1910, it was announced at the navy department today, the record far exceeding the scores of any of the other vessels of the battleship class. The score is considered remarkable and led all the other vessels by several points, making about 80 per cent of hits with her turret guns at 10,000 yards, under very unfavorable conditions.

WESTERGAARD WINS MATCH

Russian Lion Is Unable to Throw the Dane in an Hour.

BURNS CREATES A SENSATION

Farmer Produces Mahmout and Offers to Wrestle Hackenschmidt for Nothing or a Good Sized Purse—He Wants a Match.

Wrestlers from all over the world held the boards at the Auditorium Tuesday evening and issued challenges and counter challenges and watching Jess Westergaard, the giant Dane from Des Moines, win the handling match from George Hackenschmidt, the famous Russian lion. Try as he might, Hackenschmidt was not able to pin the broad shouldered Dane to the mat, while on the other hand Westergaard was behind him a dozen times and clearly showed the Omaha fans that he has been advancing rapidly in the wrestling game and that he understood the Americanized catch-as-catch-can game better than the Russian.

No Answer to Burns. Although Jack Curley, Hackenschmidt's manager, was in the crowd, he did not see fit to answer the challenge of Farmer Burns in any way. Burns introduced Dr. Krone and Dr. Messing of Chicago. Dr. Krone said that Mahmout has had a challenge up with two different Chicago papers for seven weeks for a match with Hackenschmidt, but the money was not covered.

Burns' coup was quite spectacular, as no one seemed to know that Mahmout or his manager, Antoine Pierre, was in the audience. The Turk walked upon the mat as Farmer Burns was talking and stripped to his wrestling clothes, which consist of only a breech cloth, as Mahmout wrestles without shoes or socks, but with bare toes. Although he does not talk English, he thus signified his willingness to wrestle on the spot.

The Hackenschmidt-Westergaard kept the interest of the crowd on the jump as the Russian found the big wiry Iowa no easy mark to handle. The one hold he seemed to be able to feast Jess on at all was a half nelson and bar hold, but Jess would get his big shoulder against the mat and all the efforts of Hackenschmidt failed to turn him over.

Westergaard worried the Russian somewhat by a head hold which he used continually. When the lion started out to get a toe hold or force Westergaard over on his shoulder by bracing his body against Jess' leg, the big Iowa's arm would close over his head and hold it like a vice for several minutes until Hackenschmidt could pry it loose.

Westergaard is Speedy. Several times Westergaard almost twisted the lion's tail and he showed himself to be wonderfully agile in handling the more bulky Russian. The crowd was with the Dane from the start, cheering him continually. Although Westergaard was dead tired at the close, most of the fans declared that he could have taken the Russian for another half hour and been safe from a fall.

In regard to the Burns challenge to Hackenschmidt, Westergaard and Roller, neither Curley, Hackenschmidt's manager, nor Thorson, manager of Westergaard and Roller, would talk. Curley got into a machine and drove off without seeing anyone and Hackenschmidt declared that he was wrestling whoever Curley signed. Before the Mahmout challenge had been issued at the ring, Jack Curley, when asked about it, stated that Hackenschmidt was not challenging anyone and would not accept the Mahmout challenge. He declared the Russian did not want to be known as champion of anything, but merely as the Russian lion.

Jack Tollifer of Omaha took the preliminary bout in two straight falls from Charles Miller of Kansas City, the first coming in eight minutes and fifty-five seconds with a half nelson and a bar and the second in seventeen minutes in like fashion. Tollifer proved himself to be much more experienced in the game than the Kawtown lad, being quicker in the holds, although not so heavy in build.
