NEW BILLS INTRODUCED IN HOUSE. List of Measures Added to Number Already Presented. (From a Staff Correspondent.)

LINCOLN, Jan. 12.—(Special.)—The following bills were introduced today: H. R. No. 31, by Ames of Otes—Providing for an armory building at Nebraska City to cost not more than \$20,000, on a site to be donated by the city.

H. R. No. 32, by McKislock of Gage—To authorize the purchase of 400 copies of authorized statutes for use of state officers and members of the next general assembly and appropriating \$1,000 to pay for the same.

H. R. No. 33, by Barlett of Wayne—Appropriates \$5,000 to build and equip a science and library building at the Wayne normal school, under the direction of the State Board of Education.

H. R. No. 34, by Gandy of Custer—Limits the purposes for which township road funds may be expended, cutting out payment of damages for right-of-way and for expenses in surveying new roads.

records of court proceedings from 10 cents to 5 cents per hundred words. H. R. No. 35, by Quackenbush of Nemaha—Appropriating \$12,000 to complete another story on the Peru normal library building.

H. R. No. 36, by Ellis of Dixon—To allow cities of the first and second class and villages to bond themselves to provide means of building lighting and heating plants.

H. R. No. 37, by Barto of Saline—To repeal section of civil code requiring actions for trespass to be commenced in the county where the real estate in question is situated.

H. R. No. 38, by Skiles of Butler—To increase the pay of arable and peat bidders from \$2 to \$3 a day.

H. R. No. 39, by Cox of Hamilton—To increase pay of road and bridge commissioners from \$2 to \$3 a day and the pay of councilmen from \$5 to \$10 a year.

H. R. No. 40, by Barto of Saline—To amend section 716, annotated statutes, by permitting the sale of home-made wine in quantities not less than ten gallons instead of one gallon, without a license.

H. R. No. 41, by Barto of Saline—To legalize the use of initials in connection with the full name of the defendant in a civil action.

H. R. No. 42, by Barto of Saline—To propose an amendment to the constitution creating a board of control of state institutions.

H. R. No. 43, by Burman—To provide for the drainage of water courses, streams, drainage ditch or drainage courses through private lands, to prevent their obstruction.

CARROLL TAKES OATH AGAIN

Governor of Iowa Leads for United Party in State of Iowa. STATE SHOULD FORGE AHEAD Ambitions of Men Should Be Made Secondary to General Welfare—Suggests Following Traffic's Advice.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, Jan. 12.—(Special Telegram.)—The inauguration of Governor Carroll and Lieutenant Governor Clarke took place today.

The oath was sworn in for their second term by Chief Justice Sherwin in the joint assembly before a large number of visitors. There was a musical program.

Governor Carroll delivered his address and was warmly applauded. In addition there was a brief address by Senator Lafe Young, who spoke of the necessity for education among the people and especially along agricultural lines.

Lieutenant Governor Clarke spoke briefly to the senate before announcing his committee and declared that the legislature was no place for partisanship and only the good of the state should be considered.

At the afternoon session of the senate several bills were introduced, one to abolish the office of state printer and binder and another to add a fifth judge of the district court in Polk county.

Asks for United Party. Governor Carroll in his inaugural address made a plea for the cessation of political and factional feuds in Iowa, declaring they had an unwholesome effect on the state.

"While these things may not have driven anyone from among us," said the governor, "I do not apprehend that they have in any way encouraged people to locate here, there is no inducement to come and from almost every county that these bitter factional alignments have had their influence on business conditions of the various communities. Nothing better could come to our state than that there should be an end to these matters."

"Give the business of the state precedence over the ambitions of men and let the people join in a united effort to promote the material welfare of the commonwealth."

Governor Carroll endorsed the suggestion of President Taft that Iowa halt in its efforts to legislate enough to secure compliance with the laws already enacted, so that it might be known just what additional legislation was needed.

The governor's address dealt principally with the growth and development of the state and questions relating to the doings and actions of the people as a whole.

WYOMING REPUBLICANS NAME CLARK. CHEYENNE, Wyo., Jan. 12.—At a joint caucus of republicans of the legislature held last night, Senator C. D. Clark was chosen as the nominee of the party to succeed himself, the vote being 41 to 28. This means that Senator Clark will have the full party vote and will be re-elected to the United States senate.

Five-Year-Old Boy Probably Killed by Kidnapers

No Clue Yet Found to Identity of Little Body Found in Swamp Near Albany, N. Y.

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 12.—Ald of the police in every large city of the country has been sought, this far in vain in the effort to learn the identity of the 5-year-old boy whose frozen body, with acid stains about the mouth, was found yesterday in a swamp on the Sciotoquippa road.

The body was found in a swamp on the Sciotoquippa road. The police have little doubt that the boy was slain by men who forced carbonic acid down his throat. A half empty bottle of the acid, bearing the label of an Albany druggist, was found under the body. It is the theory of the police that the child was murdered by kidnapers.

Every mark that might have served as an identification had been removed from the child's clothing. Everything about the victim, however, indicated comfortable, if not wealthy circumstances.

MOVEMENTS OF OCEAN STEAMSHIPS. NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—(Special Telegram.)—The arrival of the steamship "Albatross" from London is expected today.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—(Special Telegram.)—The army bill reported to the house today authorized the secretary of war to exceed \$50,000 for the improvement and protection of the water supply and the improvement of the grounds of the Fort D. Man Who Disappeared Twenty-Seven Years Ago is Alive—In Meantime His Wife Marries Again.

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., Jan. 12.—It was learned today that Mrs. Ida Mattox, wife of Rev. C. L. Mattox, a Baptist preacher here, is an unintentional bigamist. Mrs. Mattox's first husband, A. B. Dial, instead of being dead, as she believed, has been found to be living in Hill county, Texas.

While Dial and his wife were living near Barryville, Ark., in 1884, he disappeared. Following herself a widow, his wife in 1907 married Mattox in Carroll county, Arkansas. Efforts are being made to ascertain if Dial ever secured a divorce and action towards a legal separation of Mrs. Mattox and her husband will be delayed pending the investigation.
