

Cimaha's first Land Show will open Wednesday afternoon at 1:20 o'clock.

Preparations for the Land show are now taking shape in physical forms in the exbibits being installed at the Auditorium. Shipments of products from all points of the west and northwest have been coming in on every road for the last week. In the next two days this stream will be greatly augmented by the later arrivals. When the appointed bour arrives all will be ready to throw open to the public the first display representing the effort instituted with the purpose of developing the resources of the vast areas of the western United States an dihe diversion of the stream of emmigration which is now popuating Canada.

The second week of the Land Show HB be made significant by the first meeting of the Western Development association. This organization will be called to ordafor the first time on January 25 by Prof. George E. Condra, instructor in geology at Nebraska university,

Purpose of Association.

The Development association stands for the conservation of the resources of the west by their utilization. The delegates to the first meeting will represent all of the western states in the territory covered by the Land Show. Delegates have been named by the governors of the severol states. It is expected that more than one hundred men will gather to take council and make plans for the furtherance of the ideas for which the Land Show stands. The Western Development association bids fair to become a most important factor among the forces which shape the destiny of the great territory lying to the west of the Missouri river.
