MRS. SCHENK'S EXPERT MIXED is Feature of Corn Show at Mitchell

Dr. Osborne Admits that Schenk's Illness Might Be Due to Poison. PROGRAM FOR THE DEFENSE Attempt Will Be Made to Show that Relatives of Millionaire Are in a Conspiracy Against His Wife.

WHEELING, W. Va., Jan. 20.—Prosecuting Attorney J. E. Handian of Ohio county, who has been conducting for the state the trial of Mrs. Laura Farnsworth Schenk, who is charged with poisoning her husband, has been subpoenaed by the defense and will be put on the stand some time today.

It was intimated during the court session yesterday that such a move would be made by the attorneys for the accused, but little credence was placed in the rumors. Dr. J. J. Osborne, who was the first witness for the defense when it began to present its case at the trial yesterday and who was on the stand at adjournment of court last night, will be called again today to complete his testimony.

Plans of the Defense. Attorney O'Brien expects now to complete his case in three days, in which event it is expected Mrs. Schenk will take the stand Monday afternoon. From her it is expected to bring out an alleged conspiracy of the Schenk family against her, from the time of her marriage with John O. Schenk was made public.

Dr. Osborne Cross-Examined. Prosecutor Handian in cross-examination took up many phases of arsenic and lead poisoning and for two hours had Dr. Osborne on the grill. He admitted several points brought out by the attorney for the state.

Dr. Roy Sleppy of Pittsburgh arrived here this morning for the purpose of testifying. He will be called in connection with the testimony of Detective Nurse, Miss Zoekler, and his testimony is expected to be a sensational character.

New Method in Cross-Examination. Prosecutor Handian adopted a new method in cross-examination of Dr. Osborne this afternoon. Mr. Handian reviewed all the symptoms from which Schenk was suffering, asking if the circumstances surrounding the case, such as the wife saying "perhaps I would be better satisfied if he should die" if arsenic was found in his food, if no one was in the house except Mrs. Schenk, would he now suspect the wife, and Osborne said: "Yes."

The hypothetical question was then asked and Osborne answered the same as all of the states physicians that the patient had been suffering from arsenic poisoning and later from acute arsenical poisoning.

Dr. R. E. Sleppy of Pittsburgh was the next witness called. He was placed on the stand to show that Miss Zoekler had purchased morphine from him. The evidence was not admitted.

Alfalfa Luncheon is Feature of Corn Show at Mitchell

Four Hundred Men and Women Eat Alfalfa Biscuits and Cookies and Drink Alfalfa Tea.

MITCHELL, S. D., Jan. 20.—(Special.)—Four hundred men and women participated in an alfalfa luncheon in this city last evening as one of the big features of the State Corn show which concludes its session here this afternoon. Biscuits and cookies made from alfalfa flour and shipped here from Billings, Mont., were served the guests and tea was served made from alfalfa leaves.

It was a good deal of attention during the corn show and this popular stock food was featured at the luncheon. It is the first time it has been used in the northwest as a part of the refreshments. Prof. O. D. Center, the expert from Illinois and who scored the corn, gave a brief address in which he warned the hearts of the South Dakota corn raisers, when he stated with emphasis that the corn which he had scored was in better market condition than any he had scored in his own state.
