

FOOT BALL RULES CHANGED

Intercollegiate Committee Reduces Length of Intermissions.

CHANGE IN THE FORWARD PASS

Decide if Ball, After Being Passed and Touched, Be Fumbled and Touch Ground Pass Shall Be Incomplete.

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—The intercollegiate football rules committee did a little more surgery on the game at a meeting in New York yesterday.

With E. K. Hall of Dartmouth as chairman and Walter Camp as secretary the committee decided that intermissions were too long and reduced the periods between the first and second and the third and fourth quarters from three minutes to two minutes.

The linesman, however, is to report any infraction to the umpire.

Another new rule provides that throwing a player to the ground after the referee has declared the ball dead may be considered unnecessary roughness.

A new rule adopted specifies that all penalties under the rule regulating the forward pass shall be applied from the spot of the down and not the spot from which the pass was made.

Umpire to Keep Time. The committee transferred the duty of keeping time from the field judge to the umpire and in rule 13, section 2, which provides that a player in catching for a pass shall not be tackled or shouldered until he has caught the ball, and "taken more than one step in any direction," the words "taken more than one step in any direction" were stricken out.

The reason the committee made so few changes is that we feel the game has accomplished what the new rules started out to do—the elimination of serious injuries—and that it was now a safe and playable game.

Forward Pass Rule. It was decided that if the ball, after having been legally passed forward and been touched, shall then be fumbled and touch the ground, the pass shall be considered as incomplete.

A foul following a first or second down on or behind the goal line by a player of the side in possession of the ball, while the ball is behind the goal line or in flight from a pass or kick delivered behind the goal line, shall be penalized by the loss of a down and the ball shall be put in play for the next down on the one-yard line.

Inspecting Big Scales Now a Monthly Occupation

For the past two years the Union Pacific railroad has adopted the plan of having all its scales tested and stamped once a month. This is done to avoid disputes about the accuracy of the scales in the tremendous amount of weighing the road does.

are Charles Pussell, in charge of all Union Pacific scales; John Grant Pegg, city inspector of Omaha; T. C. Klats, scale expert for the Western Weighing association; Sam Kidd, a general expert in scales. At the South Omaha stock yards is the only automatic scale in this section.

That is a scale which weighs moving cars as they pass over it comes within 200 to 400 pounds of correct weight. The smaller scale, scrap scale, power scale and the one at Sixth and Pierce streets are even-weighing scales. Any one of them will weigh anything from 10 to 130,000 pounds.

As indicated by the names, the smaller scale is for products of that institution, the scrap scale for weighing junk of the railroad; the power scale for engines and cars going to the shops or roundhouse; and the stock scale exclusively for live stock.

The indictments charge violation of the law which prohibits concealment of loans by officials of a bank from the directors or trustees of the institution.
