He denied in every way that there was any agreement to defraud the government, and that he as well as his associates at all times acted in good faith. EASTMAN BILL IS PASSED IN HOUSE

Provision for State Agricultural School is Put Through After Long Controversy.

BILL PASSES BY BARE MAJORITY Fund of Hundred Thousand Appro-

priated for New School. HOLDREGE TO GET INSTITUTION Passage of Bill Thought to Be Linked

with Capital Removal. VIGOROUS LOBBY BOOSTS ACTION

Vote Which Possed Bill Was Fifty-One to Forty-Seven-Measure Was Rescued from Defent Several

Times.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Feb. 9 .- (Special.) - The East man agricultural school bill, over which the house has had such a prolonged controversy and which has been rescued from defeat repeatedly, was passed this afterneon by a bare majority of 51 to 47, in the lower body. The fight has been a pro-longed one and involved a reconsideration of the bill when it appeared to have been definitely defeated.

The measure appropriates \$100,000 for an agricultural school operated by the state. n Holdrege, and has been boosted by a vigorous lobby from the west, ex-Governor Shallenberger and a large number of Franklin county men at one time storming he state house in its behalf. The bill's passage is believed to be linked with the success of the capital removal
