Many Reports Filed with Body-Warne Wins Point. (From a Staff Correspondent.)

LINCOLN, Feb. 10.—(Special).—Forty-four new bills were introduced, nine were disposed of in the committee of the whole and reports on twenty were read from the chairmen of the various standing committees in the house today.

The house decided to take another Saturday off and will not meet again until Monday afternoon at 1 o'clock. Several committees will be absent on junketing trips and the judiciary and finance, ways and means committees are to hold all-day sessions.

H. R. 27, by Minor of Lancaster, prohibiting the use of trading stamps unless they define on their face the character and value of the promised pledge, was recommended for indefinite postponement.

H. R. 28, by Gandy of Carter, providing for state copyright on any farm or home, was recommended for passage.

H. R. 29, by Anderson of Kearney, the shipping pen measure, was recommended for passage as amended.

H. R. 30, by Taylor of Hitchcock, relating to the death penalty in case of conviction by circumstantial evidence, was recommended for passage.

H. R. 31, by Hadden of Wayne, appropriating \$2500 for the erection of a memorial hall and library building at the Wayne state normal, recommended for passage.

H. R. 33, by Kottow of Richardson—Provides that chattel mortgages valid for thirty days after the property has been removed from the county in which they are recorded, was recommended for indefinite postponement.

H. R. 34, by Taylor of Hitchcock, the anti-courting meet bill, a humane measure, was recommended for passage and ordered engrossed for passage.

H. R. 35, by McKelvie of Lancaster, providing for an assistant county superintendent in counties having more than 1000 rural school population, was indefinitely postponed.

H. R. 36, by Colton of York, changing the law by which wheat of alien land lands may be had, was recommended for passage.

H. R. 37, by Metzger of Chase, giving to persons confined in state institutions on account of habituated drunkenness or the drug habit the right to use the habes corpus, was recommended for passage with considerable amendment.

OLLS GRAIN INSPECTION BILL. Measure in Readiness to Establish Public Warehouse.

LINCOLN, Feb. 10.—(Special).—Senator Ollis will introduce his warehouse and grain inspection bill in the senate Monday afternoon providing that all elevators or storehouses shall be public storehouses and fixing grain inspection and standardization of grades. The bill makes all elevators public storehouses to the extent that their commercial dealings shall be uniform and they are divided into three classes. Class A includes all elevators where grain is stored in bulk and in which grain of different owners is stored together, all such warehouses to be located in metropolitan cities, that is in Omaha. Class B includes all warehouses in which grain is stored in bulk and grain of different owners is mixed together. Class C includes all warehouses of other kinds stored for commercial purposes. Licenses for running warehouses are to be required of from \$10.00 to \$50.00.

All warehouses are required to accept any grain that is offered from any customer, and after it has been duly inspected and graded it is to be placed with grain of like grade and in no case shall the mixture of grain be made. Warehouse-keepers shall not be allowed to insert in their warehouse receipts any clause which limits their own liability in regard to grain stored with them. The maximum rates to be charged for storage are specified.

The board of trade in cities where inspection is necessary is to appoint an inspector, subject to removal by the governor for two years and he shall appoint deputies. The standard grades are to be fixed by the State Railway commission. The bill does not prevent the selling of grain by sample regardless of grade. The bill has fifty sections and covers seventeen close typewritten pages.

VOLPP'S SALARY RAISE ON FILE. Measure for Increase for All Officers to Be Considered.

LINCOLN, Feb. 10.—(Special).—In the senate today S. F. 17, Senator Volpp's bill to raise the salaries of the state officers, was sent to the general file. The bill was amended in the committee and now proposes a salary of \$7,500 for the governor, the same as for the lieutenant governor or more. A tax levy of one-fifth of 1 mill is proposed to form a fund for such aid.

When the senate convened at 2 o'clock the roll called disclosed but sixteen members present. Two or three more drifted in and made a quorum. When the roll call was completed Senator Ollis moved an adjournment until Monday afternoon at 1 o'clock. The motion carried. No actual business was transacted.

MORE BILLS BEFORE LEGISLATURE. Largest Number of Bills in Any One Day Four in One House.

LINCOLN, Feb. 10.—(Special).—The following sixty-six new bills were introduced in the house this afternoon, the largest number on any day so far in the session:

H. R. 32, by Bailey of Buffalo and Prince and Sink of Hamilton—Provides for removal bill with boundary lines eliminated.

H. R. 33, by Heiliger of Jefferson—Permits persons jointly interested in a title to unite in action to defend title.

H. R. 34, by Gerdes of Richardson—Provides that in counties having more than 1000 inhabitants there shall be elected a registrar of deeds.

H. R. 35, by Prince of Hall—Exempts from taxation bonds of counties, municipalities and districts.

Oldest Elk Celebrates Hundred and First Anniversary. Joseph Tuffiel of Marshalltown, Still Active in Business, Says He Will Live to Be Hundred and Ten.

MARSHALSTOWN, Ia., Feb. 10.—(Special).—One hundred and one years ago, the oldest Elk in the world, active, vigorous and daily prosecuting his business, Joseph Tuffiel of this city, probably one of the most remarkable men of the state, today quietly celebrated his 101st anniversary.

Mr. Tuffiel celebrated his 101st anniversary by being initiated into Marshall lodge No. 312, Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks.

So active is the old man that he not only is able to personally take care of his real estate business, but he is rugged enough so that he saws and splits all the wood and kindling used to heat his office.

From all outward appearances Mr. Tuffiel is no older than he was when he was ninety. He says he is going to live to be 118, but already he has shattered practically all central Iowa records, and there is probably not another man of his age in the country who is actively attending to his business with the same firmness and mental vigor as Mr. Tuffiel. He has complete use of all his faculties.

Mr. Tuffiel attributes his long years to moderation in all things. He does not use tobacco in any form, does not drink, is a hearty eater and sleeps from eight to ten hours every night. He has seldom been sick.

LONGEST DITCH IN STATE OF IOWA. Proposition Up at Emmetsburg that Will Cost Nearly \$250,000.

EMMETTSBURG, Ia., Feb. 10.—(Special).—The longest and the most expensive ditch that has ever been dug in Iowa is now interesting the boards of supervisors of Palo Alto and Pocahontas counties. The survey has been completed and the cost computed at \$240,000. The open ditch is to be 1200 feet long—approximately twenty-five miles. Running into this will be twenty-five laterals, and if these could be computed in the length of the ditch it would be more than fifty miles long. The ditch will commence near Ayrshire and will empty into Pilot creek near Rolfe. The supervisors will take the matter up early in March and objections, if there are to be any, will be taken up and damages determined. There are hundreds of farmers along the proposed survey who are enthusiastic over the big ditch and it is quite sure to be dug.
